GRAND OUTLOOK
AT CLEVELAND

Management Expects to Care for
30,000 Fans at Opening
Today.

Sports Are Looking for Strenuous
Battles Between Eel and
Darkey Hal.

THE LATTER IS IN SHAPE

But Dan McEwen's Wiggler Will Be
a Big Obstacle—Trainer Snow
at Detroit.

The Detroit Free Press, speaking of the Blue Ribbon meet, says:
Trainers are getting anxious to start in at the big track, but Secretary Moore has advised them not to be in a hurry, owing to the certainty of April rains.
The track is in excellent condition, but still covered with straw and refuse which was used to protect it and enrich the soil in the winter. This will not be taken off until about May 1. Meanwhile it is all right for jogging. The roads in the inclosure are good this spring, and the trainers now in the barns are using them right along.

Snow Arrives.
Probably the first of the outsiders to arrive here will be W. L. Snow, of Hornell, N. Y., who has about the largest of any of the public scabbers. Mr. Snow has 25 at the covered track and others are to be sent to him. He will occupy one of the big barns built two years ago and half of an adjoining barn.
Mr. Snow has horses for many classes and his presence is a great help to any meeting. It is expected that he will make a number of starts at the Blue Ribbon meeting and come back in the fall for the fair.

Rival Canadian Pacers.
One of the horses that Mr. Snow will bring with him is the pacing mare Darkey Hal, that raced in 2024 last year, and was the medium of one of the greatest victories of the year when she beat George Gano at Columbus. In other years John Swarts, owner of the mare, has not turned her over to Mr. Snow until almost time to score for the year but this year he has changed his programme, and she has been at the covered track for a couple of weeks.
Darkey Hal is to be trained for the free-for-all pacing events, down the line, and this means a battle royal for the Canadian championship.
Eel the Obstacle.
Many think she can land it, but the obstacle in the way is the grey horse, The Eel, that Dan McEwen will start in the same event. McEwen also will train at the fair grounds, and will see that The Eel is ready when the day comes. The Canadians are divided in their opinion, and when the pair of hobbler meets there will be some action.

In the same free-for-all class will be found George Gano, Alton Wilson, Ross K. and a few others who can scout around the oval, as the event has a fine look at a distance.

NO VAUDEVILLE.
SAYS T. LYNCH
National League President Does Not Approve of Kling's Latest Stunt.
New York, April 20.—President Lynch of the National League, fearing that Johnny Kling, the recalcitrant catcher of the Chicago club, intended to raise the \$700 fine imposed upon him by the national commission for refusing to act in vaudeville, announced tonight that he had sent the following telegram to Chairman Herrmann of the national commission, at Cincinnati:
"I suggest that you take steps to stop Kling appearing in vaudeville. He cannot make a burlesque of the national game. Insist on his reporting to his club at once or the commission will take further action in his case." If Kling defies the commission, President Lynch will ask to have the case reopened.

SHY AS TO WEIGHT
Jeffries Locks Himself In When He Steps on the Scale.
New York, April 20.—Fistic followers in the east are much puzzled today over the weight of Jim Jeffries, and no other topic of the Jeffries-Johnson mill is coming in for so much discussion. Berger is quoted in the west as saying that the big fellow will weigh not less than 225 pounds when he enters the ring.
The belief is fairly general here that Jeffries weighs close to 250 pounds. As his most successful contests were fought at about 220 pounds, it will not be very hard for Jeffries to train down 25 pounds.
Jeffries is as shy as a girl about stepping on the scales in the presence of visitors, and western stories say that he locks himself in a room when he weighs himself.

It may be that the handball court was a sly scheme of Jeff's to forestall the negro's tendency to turn his back and hang on to the ropes whenever he receives a few smashing blows. In the handball court Bob tried his running-away tactics with poor success.

A Lively Bout.
This morning's bout was not a very lively one, however. Few hard blows were struck on either side, and the two men clinched and pulled each other around the court a great part of the time. Jeff said he did not let himself out because he was a little stiff.

Wants Longer Fight.
"I would rather fight fifteen rounds than box two," said Jeff, and his action in the ring indicates the truthfulness of his expression. At the same time, he calls attention to a shortage in camp of men who can stand up to Jeff and take a lot of punishment without flinching. Armstrong so far has shown no willingness to do this. When Jim Corbett arrives his usefulness will consist in teaching the big fellow head work, how to use his arms and legs and body cleverly. Jeff is eager to get into some sort of condition he may be able to stand up before Jeff and give him the fast, smashing sort of a fight he craves.

Will Carry a Lot of Money
on July 4.

THE BOILERMAKER'S CAMP

Is Full of Has-Beens, Who Can Do
Him No Good, Declares the
Champion.

[By Associated Press.]
Chicago, April 21.—Jack Johnson, champion pugilist, believes his sparring partners will be of greater use to him than those of Jeffries will be to the former champion.
In Jeffries' case will be a number of men who will be unable to stand up beating Jeffries will give them, and consequently Jeffries will not derive the proper kind of benefit. Johnson said: "With the exception of Gotch, Jeffries will not have a man in his camp who will do him a bit of good in a practical way. Lot of Huskies.

"I intend to fight Jeffries from the top of the bell. By this I do not mean I will waste into him and be careless, but I shall not be afraid to mix matters."
"I realize I have a lot at stake, and I know there will be thousands of dollars bet on my chances, and I want to assure the people who back me in this fight that I will put forth every ounce of my physical strength to win."
