PEOPLE ARE MILD IN LONDON'S ROADS

Mr. Jos. Lawrence Objects to Luxuries When Necessities Stare People in Face.

CELLARS FULL OF WATER

South London Man Gave His Opinion on Several Matters—Electricification of L. and P. S. R.

Mr. Joseph Lawrence, of South London, was the principal speaker at a well-attended meeting of the East End Progressive Association last evening, and spent considerable time in pointing out the mistakes of the present city council to the members of the society. Mr. Lawrence was also firm in his denunciation of the proposal to revert to the single sessions in the kindergarten. In a very modest manner he stated that he had drawn the attention of the school board to the system in vogue four years ago, and his efforts were finally rewarded by the adoption of the double-session system. The speaker stated that the school board was a very expensive body, and the members should be compelled to have a property qualification the same as the aldermen.

The meeting did not adopt Mr. Lawrence's suggestion to pass a resolution in favor of the present double sessions being continued.

A Municipal Slate.

Mr. Lawrence suggested that the East End Progressives, the West London Progressives, and the Central Real Estate Owners each appoint three members to act as a committee to procure suitable candidates for the approaching municipal elections, as the present aldermen have proved themselves unfit to cope with the various matters of importance to the city.

Mr. Lawrence criticised the actions of the council in regard to the West London breakwater, and the comfort of the council in regard to the water supply. He stated that he had no businessmen would think of erecting a \$6,000 building on a \$60,000 lot. The speaker stated that the idea of building the city hall there was never seriously considered, according to the speaker.

The incinerator was another great mistake from his point of view, as it will be put out of commission inside of two years on account of the large number of writs that will be issued against the corporation. The water works and electrical departments were in need of reorganizing.

"Of course, the aldermen are not entirely to blame in the mismanagement of the civic problems, and I hold the mayor responsible for much of the trouble. He is too outspoken and was altogether too hasty in the Engineer Wright matter," stated Mr. Lawrence in summing up the civic management.

Strong Talk.

Mr. Lawrence was asked for his opinion of several of the questions that are likely to be brought before the electors on election day, and as a rule he was decidedly against supporting any of the candidates.

"The advocates of the federal square proposition are fit candidates for the lunatic asylum. Personally, I don't care where the hall is erected, but why the city should pay for a parade ground for the militia department is beyond me. We would lose the McCormick factory, and also would lose the taxes which we ourselves have water in our cellars and are mired in the roads?"

Scheme Would Not Pay.

In regard to the electrification of the Port Stanley road he said he would not like to condemn the scheme, nor was he prepared to adopt it. In his estimation it would not be a paying scheme. The storm sewers were a necessity in some parts of the city, and should be installed in the sections in which the citizens are troubled by flooded cellars. He was in favor of the annexation of the different suburbs if all the different sides of the question were presented in a true light.

"The city is deeply in debt, and these suburbs will eventually be asked to pay for some of the present improvements, and as soon as that happens there will be trouble," was Mr. Lawrence's opinion.

The association appointed a committee, composed of Messrs. Wakeling, W. Hay and Leah, to attend the meeting of the Ontario railway and municipal board this afternoon to see that the interests of the citizens of the East End were considered.

Box for Newspapers.

The secretary was instructed to ask the postoffice department to install a newspaper box at the corner of Campybell and Rectory streets, and a letter-box at the corner of Elias and Elizabeth streets.
