During one of his bad spells, Mrs. Beemer mentioned to Mason that her husband had wanted her to get some poison a few days previous to kill rats, and she added: "Thank God, I didn't get it. They would think poisoned him.'

Cross-examined, Mason admitted that he had served a couple of jail sentences in England for theft, but sentences in England for theft, declared he was drunk when the thefts were committed. Mason said he came from Great Yarmouth, Eng., where his father is a police inspector.

been inaugurated to prevent the Hon. George E. Foster succeeding to the premiership of Canada. Hon. His distined jealously in associates with more ambition and less capacity. Ever since the Borden Government was formed there has been ceaseless effort to put Hon. Mr. Foster to one side. His admission to the cabinet was opposed. He was denied the finance portfolio. He was sent to Australia when the naval debate was on, and will be out of Canada most of the coming session if his critics have their way.

Favor "Bob" Rogers. The majority group now favor Hon Robert Rogers as the next prime minister of Canada. Those behind the movement feel that the public is not quite ready to receive Hon. Mr. Rogers, but should prefer Hon. George E. Foster. Therefore When Premier Borden fainted at the official dinner to provincial premiers and showed how serious is the condition of his health, there was considerable consternation. Premier Borden was hurried away on his second search for health.

It is hoped that he may be able t go through the coming session and possibly may remain at his post until the general elections have been held.

Should the Government be again returned the way will have been prepared for Hon. Mr. Rogers to take the premiership, again pushing Hon. Mr. Foster to one side. An effort will be made by Hon. Mr. White. Mr. Rogers and other ambitious ministers to induce Mr. Foster to accept the chairmission. His long experience and adhesion to the principles of protection manship of a permanent tariff comwould make him an acceptable chairman to the interest which support the present Government.

To Hold Local Option Campaigns In Three Hundred Municipalities

[Canadian Press.]
Chicago, Nov. 6.—As a result of the showing made at the elections Tuesday, when the votes of recently enfranchised women are said to have placed 18 out of 24 municipalities voting, in the "dry" column three hundred cities and villages of Illinois will hold local option areas next spring. This was the statement yesterday of F. Scott McBride state superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League.

"Under normal conditions," said Mr. McBride, "as the vote of Tuesday shows, the women will be three to one on the side of the drys. Organized properly, the proportion should be four to one.

Chicago may be one of the cities to face the "wet" and "dry" issue in the spring, according to report, although it is the understanding that the Anti-Saloon League does not faver a vote in Chicago so soon. The Liberals are said to be considering the advisability of bringing suit to test the constitutionality of the sarrage law in order to prevent the women from voting at the proposed option elections in April.

Only the Canadian Government and Parliament can decide when, in what manner, and at what cost Canada shall aid the mother country in such a crisis. The aid given by Canada to South Africa was all the more valuable because it was entirely voluntary."

CANADA IS LOYAL.

"Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Canadian Liberals only ask that the rights which Canada enjoys shall remain unimpaired, but no one who knows of Canada's part in the South African war, no one who knows the loyal sentiments of the Canadian people, can doubt that if at any time Great Britain should become involved in a war with any of the great powers, Canada would spring to her aid and be ready to make any sacrifice of blood or treasure that might be necessary for the maintenance of the honor or interests of the
