BISHOP FALLON DENIES ANY INJURY TO FRENCH

Offers \$25,000 for Proof to Contrary—Feeling High Round Tilbury.

TILBURY, June 24.—Bishop Fallon, of London, attempted to pour oil on the troubled waters over the bilingual question here tonight, when at a confirmation service held in St. Francis church, he declared, with the greatest emphasis, that he is the friend of the French-Canadians, and denied that he had ever done anything in any way to injure them.

"I am a poor man," he said, "but I will give \$25,000, even if I have to go around and beg it, to any man who can show that I have done anything derogatory to the French-Canadians."

Malicious Stories.
Bishop Fallon denounced as malicious the stories which have been circulated to the effect that he had forbidden the teaching of French.

He asked all those present to contradict any such reports wherever they heard them.

Just how warm a feeling exists in this district against Bishop Fallon is shown by the fact that there were few in the audience. It was stated to the Advertiser, that the men of the church are greatly aroused over Bishop Fallon's alleged attitude and that their absence tonight was prearranged.

"In discussing the situation, Bishop Fallon declared that he had never made many of the statements attributed to him. He denied the statements made by five priests recently, and said, that he wished to thank Father Parent for standing by him so loyally. Father Parent is the rector of the local church.

275 Were Confirmed.
There 275 presented for confirmation, by His Lordship, and in concluding his address to the boys and girls, Bishop Fallon asked them to pledge themselves never to touch liquor until they were 21 years old.

The visit of Bishop Fallon has been looked forward with eager interest by the French-Canadians of the district. It was expected that he would have something to say in regard to bilingualism, and there have been many keen discussions over the matter among the parishioners.

WRECK LOCATED BY PT. HURON FISHERMEN

Declare They Took Keys of Whiskey From Hull Near Goderich.

FIRST RURAL SURVEY HELD IN HURON COUNTY

Interesting Papers Read Dealing With Education and Character Forming.

EXETER, June 24.—A mass meeting held in the rink on Tuesday afternoon at 1:30, was addressed by the Hon. Mr. Hanna. A large crowd was in attendance and the Exeter band played.

After the political meeting at 4 o'clock, the Huron County first rural survey in Canada was held in the town hall. This survey has been undertaken by the joint boards of social service and evangelism of the Presbyterian and Methodist churches. It gives exhibits of Huron County by charts, diagrams and stereopticon views, showing actual comparisons of changes, failures and growth for forty years. Rev. James A. Ford, Goderich, president, Rev. S. F. Sharp, Exeter, secretary.

The meeting opened with Rev. Colin Fletcher, M.A., in the chair. After a few remarks by the chairman, the Rev. S. F. Sharp, B.A., B.D., read a thoughtful paper on "The Church and the Rural Community," in which he showed very clearly why the church interests itself in the rural districts, the rural problem, and how everything that is in the best interests of the country is of great importance to the church.

W. G. Medd, Winchelsea, spoke on "Huron From Within," calling attention to the fundamental need of a progressive spirit and mutual trust to insure progress. He then dealt with the question of co-operation, especially among farmers, in the manufacture of butter and cheese.

"Our Needs and Achievements," was the subject of John Rowcliffe's address. He distinguished between needs and wants, and showed that needs and achievements are most closely linked together, and that both reveal very largely the character of people.

In the absence of Mr. Hart, Prof. S. B. McCready, director of elementary agricultural education, for Ontario, emphasized the need of a special education for country life. After an interesting discussion, the meeting adjourned to meet at night.

Evening Session.
The evening session opened at 8 o'clock with an address and lantern views by Mr. McCready on the different types of schools in Ontario and on the schools of other countries that have been most efficient in giving an education suited to the needs of the country.

Taylor Statten, national boys' work secretary of Y. M. C. A., gave an inspiring address on the four-fold development of youth, necessary to the making of good character and efficient citizenship. He outlined a plan which will soon be sent to every minister and other educational work, for the promoting, by community effort, of this end.

A. J. W. Myers, Ph.D., gave lantern slide views showing some results of the Huron survey, and all were deeply interested and set thinking on the conditions of, and problems confronting Huron County, and were led to think of old questions in a new way.

It was the wish of the meeting that the full report of the survey be printed, and that later in the year other meetings be held to discuss further the many questions. The same program will be given in Clinton on Wednesday, and Auburn on Thursday.

There was a fairly large audience of representative people, and all were deeply interested and set thinking on the conditions of, and problems confronting Huron County, and were led to think of old questions in a new way.

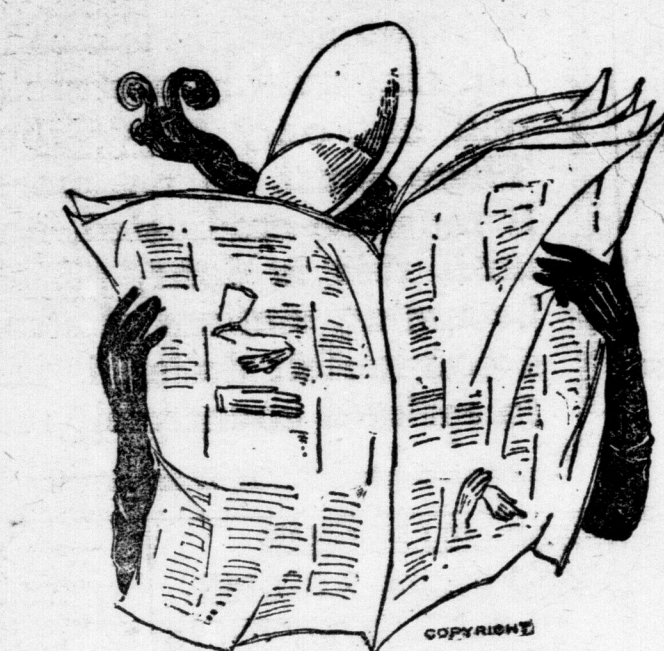
