

THE LOCAL MARKET

On account of the wet weather, there was not much for sale on the local market this morning. Up till 9:30 o'clock, three loads of hay and a couple loads of oats had been sold. The demand was brisk. Hay went back to \$13.50 per ton for the top crop.

Oats are going for \$1.25 to \$1.45 per bushel, with a brisk demand. There is a good demand for straw. There has been a lull in some time, consequently the demand is brisk.

There is no change in the prices of hogs. There will be a shipment on Wednesday in all probability.

Poultry is slow, especially dressed poultry. There was not much demand for it in the market house Saturday. Dressed ducks went as low as \$1 per pair.

Some choice Northern Shropshire sold for \$1.75 per barrel Saturday. Apples seem to be selling well.
