Government Official Says All Restaurants Serve Milk Under Standard.

Proprietors of three local restaurants will appear in police court Thursday morning to answer charges that they have been serving milk lacking the prescribed minimum quantity of butter-fat. It is expected that other are governed by the provisions of the pure food act.

Discussing the question, one of the proprietors explains that the fault, if any, is not to be shouldered by them. The dairyman, he contends, is the one responsible. They buy the milk, he points out, from the milk dealer as being up to the standard and serves it accordingly. The proprietor of another popular restaurant declared that the method of the official in taking the sample of milk for test was not fair to the restaurant keepers. 


