

WORLD NEWS CUT SHORT

LONDON, March 31.—A bill to legitimize the offspring of unmarried parents is to be introduced shortly in the House of Commons as a government measure, according to Captain George E. Bowyer, member of parliament for Buckingham. He made an announcement in an address at a meeting of the National Association for Health, Maternity and Welfare.

March 30.—Snow fell yes-terday on the Alban Hills, a short distance from Rome. A snowfall of the year is unprecedented. WARSAW, March 30.—George Chalski, minister of finance, yesterday explained to the National Assembly the financial situation of Poland between Nov. 1, 1918, and Dec. 31, 1921. During this period the expenditures amounted to 324,000,000 Polish marks, and the revenue to 162,000,000,000, making a deficit of 222,000,000,000 Polish marks. The internal debt of the country on Dec. 31, 1921, the minister said, was in excess of 251,000,000,000 Polish marks, and the foreign debt was 253,000,000,000.

VIENNA, March 30.—According to a report in the Prague newspapers, the Czechoslovakian government has decided to issue orders to all female employees in the civil service that in the future they must appear at

the offices in string blouses "closed up to the neck." This limitation of the "principle of self-determination," the ground on which the new state came into existence, is causing indignation and consternation among the typists of Prague.

GENOA, March 30.—More than a hundred ships are moored in this port as a result of the longshoremen's strike, which began at Naples a few days ago and spread to all Italian ports. It was estimated today that 300,000 tons of merchandise are in the Genoa harbor ready to be unloaded, and there are forty shiploads of coal on vessels lying at anchor.

Many industries in Northern Italy have been forced to shut down for lack of coal.

SHANGHAI, March 30.—Mrs. W. J. Snyder of Brazil, Ind., was killed yesterday and four other persons were wounded when two Koreans made an abortive attempt to assassinate General Gilchi Tanaka, former Japanese minister of war, upon his arrival here from Manila.

Mrs. Snyder was just stepping off the ship and was not more than 20 feet from the Japanese general, when the Koreans opened fire. She was accompanying her husband on a trip around the world. The Koreans were arrested immediately. They made a full confession that their purpose was to kill General Tanaka.

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, March 30.—With the presidential elections only three days away, the political campaign is waxing violent with almost nightly street clashes in Buenos Aires between adherents of the rival factions. Revolver firing is a feature of these clashes, but most of it is firing in the air, with the intention of terrifying participants in parades or street corner meetings of the opposing parties. Thus far two persons have been seriously wounded. The police are kept busily engaged every night in suppressing disturbances.

Dr. Marcelo T. de Alvear, Argentine minister to France, is the presidential candidate of the Radical Party, and Dr. Horberto Piroso the nominee of the Concentration National, a combination of Conservatives, Democrats and members of other parties.

VIENNA, March 30.—Austria is rapidly developing a serious industrial situation, threatening to revive the political controversy which has been latent since the ultimatum of Lieut. Commander Edward H. Young, the British controller, that British credit was contingent upon the retention of the Schöberl ministry. Unemployment is steadily increasing, and at the present time more than 100,000 craftsmen are out of work, while the advance in the cost of living goes on unchecked.

Starting from internal causes, the industrial situation suddenly became worse by the decline of the German mark. The newspapers say that foreign buyers are transferring their orders to Germany, as Austria is unable to meet German prices.

PARIS, March 30.—A dispatch from Constantinople says that the entire Armenian nation is faced with blindness, according to Dr. R. T. Chis, head of the medical department of the Near East Relief.

This situation, he says, is due to the epidemic of trachoma raging throughout the country. Examination of 30,000 refugees revealed the fact that 27,000, or 90 per cent, were in the first stages of the disease. As at the beginning of the disease is painless, both eyes are often deeply affected before its presence is known. The disease has been known in the Caucasus for many generations, but the present epidemic is due to the lowered resistance of the population.

"If the proportion holds good in all parts of Armenia," Dr. Chis says, "the situation is one of the most serious with which any nation has ever confronted. Only an extensive medical campaign can save the country from becoming a nation of blind."
