LONDON, April 14.—(By Canadian Press.)—The flat racing season in England starts on its fifth week on Easter Monday, and increased activity in racing circles will be noted. On Monday racing will be carried on at three tracks—Kempton Park (Easter meeting), Birmmington (Easter meeting), and at Newcastle-Gosforth Park. Epsom Park will open a two-day spring meeting on Tuesday.

Three of the more important of the spring races are scheduled for the coming week. On Monday the Queen's Stakes is the feature event at Kempton Park. This race, a handicap for a plate of one thousand sovereigns, for three-year-olds and up will be run over the mile and one-half course. Included in the field are six horses nominated for the 1922-23 season, including the four-year-old Bowood. Lord Derby's entry included Harrier, Cravasse, Stanislaus and Glorioso. Harrier was placed at the head of the weights with 125 pounds. R. F. Heybourn's Trepanner was allotted second high weight of 124 pounds.

Tuesday the Great Metropolitan stakes will be the main event. This race, a handicap for the 1922-23 season, will be run over the mile and one-half course. The field is expected to include a three-year-old, one of the three-year-olds to win the 1922-23 season, Hampton, founder of the Hampton line

RESULTS TECH. EXAMS IS GIVEN

Percentage of Passes Shows Increase Over Last Year.

Marks End of Winter's Curriculum in All Departments of School.

The winter term at the London Technical and Art School is now over and within a week or so the summer term will begin. The examinations have been written and the results are now being announced. The majority of students have received high marks, it is claimed, and the failures are fewer than last year. The students are divided into four classes, the results being as follows:

Class 1 includes those who made 75 per cent or more on the whole examination and no failure, that is, not below 40 per cent in any one subject. Class 2 includes those who made 60 per cent or more on the whole examination and no failure in any subject. Class 3 includes those who made 50 per cent or more on the whole examination and not more than two failures. Class 4 includes those who made 40 per cent or more on the whole examination and not more than two failures.

RIVAL GROUPS OF MINERS WAR

BOTH STAND PAT.
Hazleton, Pa., April 15.—The third week of the anthracite coal mine suspension started today with no break in ranks among the men, and no efforts on the part of any company to resume, according to statements given out at headquarters of the union.

The streets of Hazleton and all other large anthracite centers in this district were alive with idle miners today in preparation for the observance of Easter, which is always one of their big holidays. In normal times the collieries generally have been forced to shut down the Monday of Easter on account of the Dublin celebration.

ASK NON-UNIONISTS' AID.
Indianapolis, April 14.—With the end today of the second week of the general suspension of work in the coal industry, interest at union headquarters here was centered in the prospect of enlisting more non-union workers in the walkout. The total of 665,000 idle miners, claimed by the unions, showed a gain of more than 25,000 during the week, and the opinion in union circles was that the strike had not yet reached its peak strength.

Gains scored in the Pennsylvania coke districts were the most significant developments from the union point of view, while the only reverse seemed the temporary injunction affecting two important West Virginia activities. In the latter fields, however, the union did not admit any loss of men, who joined in the suspension during the first week. Plans also were being laid by counsel for the union to contest the court orders, with the view of casting them aside, in whole or part.

The support gained in the Pennsylvania non-union fields had encouraged union officials to concentrate much of its work there, new organizers having been sent into the districts. While the hope apparently was to gain a complete shutdown of the mines there, no prediction of success had yet been made by union officials. Organizers in some localities were said to be having trouble establishing contact with the non-union workers, union officials asserting that meetings were difficult or impossible because of the activities of the mine guards.
