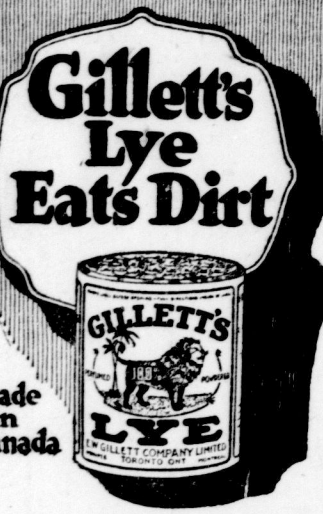

KEHOE TO FACE PERJURY TRIAL

Sombra Farmer Required to Give Increased Amount of Bail.

DETROIT MAN RELEASED

Rex Bush, Alleged Falsely Convicted, Testifies in Sarnia Court.

SARNIA, March 23.—Peter Kehoe, a well-known farmer residing in Sombra Township, accused of perjury and "framing" a charge of robbery, which resulted in a jail sentence for Rex Bush of Detroit, was committed for trial in the county police court here this afternoon, after a preliminary hearing lasting four hours. Bail was increased, Kehoe entering into a personal recognizance of \$6,000, with two other securities of \$3,000 each.

A number of witnesses for the prosecution were heard, including Carmen Mitchell, awaiting trial on a charge of robbery at Port Lambton, who testified to having dealings with the accused on and around May 19 last, which culminated in the purchase by Mitchell of Kehoe's stock of liquor for the robbery. Kehoe was sent to jail on June 3. Receipts for \$1,600, alleged to be signed by Kehoe was produced in court.

Frame-up Alleged.
The case has wide ramifications and promises to be one of the most extraordinary cases arising out of the Ontario temperance act. The prosecution claims not only that the charges against Bush were a deliberate and diabolical frame-up, but also that the factor which influenced the conviction of Bush more than any other was a direct result of a mistake on the part of crown authorities in making inquiries from Detroit employers named by defence witnesses to establish their veracity.

Evidence was brought in to show that the inquiries were made at the wrong addresses and replies were naturally received saying that the parties named were not known. Magistrate J. J. Jarvis, who brought in the conviction against Bush, stated in evidence that the letters received disowning the witnesses who swore an alibi for Bush had influenced him considerably in convicting the man.

Released On Bail.
Bush was in court, having been released on bail following indices of stated case made by Haney and McNally when he had undergone three or four weeks of his sentence. In the witness box he claimed to have been in Detroit until 3 a.m. of the morning of the robbery, his evidence on this point being corroborated by Guy Cottow of Detroit.

The defence seeks to show that Kehoe framed the charge against Bush in order to avoid a charge being laid against himself of disposing of his liquor contrary to the provisions of the Ontario temperance act.

WILL REQUEST OPINION ON CONTROL OF NATURAL GAS

Representatives of Municipalities of Western Ontario Interested to Meet in Toronto March 30.

TORONTO, March 23.—All municipalities of Western Ontario interested in natural gas distribution and conservation will be asked to express opinions as to whether they want provincial government control or not. The call has gone out that such representations be made at a meeting in Toronto on March 30, Minister of Mines Mills told a deputation representative of the Natural Gas and Petroleum Association of Canada, which waited on the government this afternoon.

The position taken by the natural gas interests is that there be either complete government control or no control at all. They asked that either natural gas conservation act extended to give complete control, or all legislation governing the industry be wiped off.

The members of the deputation strongly protested against the bill recently introduced by R. L. Brackin (West Kent) which, they claim, is wiping out the effectiveness of the national gas conservation act, and going back largely to the conditions that prevailed in 1919, kills any advantage of contracts that gas companies have, while holding them to others that were not so favorable to their interests.

WILL MOVE REPEAL OF MILITARY SERVICE ACT

J. S. Woodsworth Would Also Restrict Activities of Mounted Police.

OTTAWA, March 23.—(By Canadian Press.)—J. S. Woodsworth, Labor, has given notice that he will move in the Commons "an act to repeal the Military Service Act, 1917." Mr. Woodsworth has also given notice of his intention to move a resolution which would confine the activities of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police to territories not included in any province of Canada.

W. J. Kennedy, Progressive, Glenora-Stormont, has given notice that he will ask the government to state in the Commons what sums have been advanced or what is the amount of loans guaranteed to the Canadian Northern, Grand Trunk, or Grand Trunk Pacific, since the time that such loans or advances were authorized during the last session of parliament.

Hon. W. R. Motherwell, minister of agriculture, has given notice of motion in the House of Commons to refer the memorandum presented to the Canadian government by the Canadian Council of Agriculture regarding the establishment of the Canadian wheat board to the committee on agriculture. Some days ago the prime minister announced that this course was intended.

Pay Tribute At Bier of Premier's Brother.

TORONTO, March 23.—Many friends of Premier W. L. Mackenzie King gathered at the union station here this afternoon, when the prime minister, accompanied by the body of his brother, the late Dr. D. MacDougall King, reached the city from Denver.

The premier was met by his brother-in-law and sister of Barrie, and Mr. and Mrs. George S. Lindsay, his cousins. Three automobiles full of flowers led the long line of cars on the way to Mount Pleasant Cemetery.

Classmates of the late Dr. King at Varsity, graduates with him in medicine in 1902, were represented by Dr. E. Henderson, Dr. T. M. McLaughlin, Dr. Arthur H. Wright, Dr. O. C. H. Withrow.

The ministers were—Rev. John Inkster and Dr. A. B. Winchester, and Rev. Dr. Aikens of Montreal.

FAILS TO IDENTIFY CLOTH FOUND BY TORONTO POLICE

F. W. Heard, St. Thomas, Whose Store Was Recently Robbed, Has Disappointing Trip.

ST. THOMAS, March 23.—F. W. Heard, whose tailor shop on Talbot street, this city, was robbed of more than 100 bolts of cloth early Tuesday morning, failed to identify as his any of the goods held by the police in Toronto, when accompanied by his wife, he made a special trip to that city for the purpose Thursday.

Mr. Heard was disappointed to learn when he reached police headquarters there that the goods which the police found on a veranda in that city consisted entirely of silks and linens. Not a piece of wool cloth could be found among the lot.

A wire was received from the chief of police in Toronto by the local police Thursday morning asking that Mr. Heard come to that city to identify the cloth which had been found. Up to the present time the police have been unable to find any trace of the thieves.

SOVIET OFFICIALS CALL PHYSICIANS

BERLIN, March 23.—"Doctors Klemperer and Foster, German medical authorities who have been called to Moscow, are to examine the leading personalities of the Soviet regime to determine whether a vacation at some foreign resort is necessary," says a Soviet announcement published here today as a denial that the physicians have been called by Premier Lenin only.

The Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung, commenting upon the great honor to German medical science in being asked to determine if the leading Soviet officials should leave the country for their health, asks if Russia is so short of doctors that foreigners are necessary to decide this question.

ALTER PERSONNEL OF COMMITTEES

OTTAWA, March 23.—(Canadian Press.)—Extensive changes in the personnel of select, standing committees of the house are shown in the list of names submitted by the striking committee and approved by the house today.

The committees are drawn upon a basis of five government members to four combined opposition. Chairmen will be chosen at the organization meetings, which will probably be called next week.

Some of the committees are very large, notably railways and canals, with 126 members; agriculture and colonization, with 105; banking and commerce, 82, and private bills, 62. Twenty-five members constitute a quorum of the railways committee, and 21 members of the other large bodies.

EXPECT ADVANCE IN WINDSOR TAX RATE

Finance Commissioners Surprised at Auditors' Announcement of 35 Mills.

TO PRUNE ESTIMATES

Fail to Reduce Expenditure Proposed By Police Department.

WINDSOR, March 23.—Windsor's tax rate will be 35 mills, the highest in city's history, unless finance committee succeeds in pruning estimates.

Finance committee of city council, in special session Thursday, was staggered by Auditor Holton's announcement that the tax rate would not be less than 35 mills. It was expected that it would be above 30 mills, but not more than 32 mills.

Members of the committee gasped, and some shouted, "What will people say?"

Last year tax was 28 mills, in 1920 it was 34 mills, but the assessment was approximately \$20,000,000 less than it is now. The budget that faces the finance committee totals in the neighborhood of \$1,750,000. The committee was so surprised at the auditor's announcement that it failed to carry out its threats to "trim to the bone" the estimates of the police department. Not a single dollar was cut from proposed expenditure, and Chief Constable Thompson made a convincing plea for additional officers. The rate will be struck Monday night, but some reduction in estimates may be made tomorrow night by the finance committee.

WOMEN'S LABOR PARTY BACKS JUVENILE COURT

Pleased City's Fish Market Retained; Say Prices Reasonable, Quality Excellent.

Members of the Women's Labor Party, which the president, Mrs. Fred White, states is "going ahead by leaps and bounds," are rejoicing over the announcement that the city fish market will be kept open. Wednesday evening at their weekly meeting, where, following a weekly precedent, new members were received, a vigorous protest was registered against the shutting-up of the municipal fish stall, declared to be an inestimable boon to families with small incomes. Talking to The Advertiser Thursday, the president said: "People in better circumstances might not patronize the fish stall, but members of laboring people have been in the habit of buying there, finding the fish always of good quality and reasonable of price."
