Often these officers have night duty ahead of them, and because they have no op tion, they are forced to lose many

hours of rest. The small courtroom, with crowds, also makes it difficult to locate witnesses who may be waiting anywhere in the dark hallways or stairways. Cases are often delayed while a search is being made. Far from cheerful are the dark, barrack-rooms where officers spend their time while on duty but not cut. on beats, while facilities offered are of the crudest

It has been suggested in som quarters that for the sake of economy and efficiency, the police station should be made a part of the proposed new city hall, but this suggestion does not meet with the approval of Chief of Police Birrell.

He stated that in many cities where the scheme was tried out, a change back to a separate building had been made.
