Special to London Advertiser. CHATHAM, Oct. 24.-Ex-Mayor Harry Westman announced today that he would again be candidate for the board of water commissioners for the next two years. He still holds to the water supply from Lake Erie as the ultimate solution to the water problem for the city, and stated today that his object in again appealing to the public for their support is for the privilege of continuing his work until the city gets its drinking water from Lake
