TOWN OF LA SALLE PROTESTS METHOD USED BY TOWNSHIP

Incorporation of Essex County's Newest Town Granted by Legislature Committee.

MAYOR'S TERM REDUCED

Toronto, March 18.—The private bills committee of the legislature this morning passed a bill incorporating a part of the Township of Sandwich West into a town to be known as LaSalle. Representatives of the township opposed the incorporation. Counsel representing the new incorporation stated that they had been unable to get the township to spend any money on waterworks or sewers for the area which is a huge real estate subdivision with considerable building. Of the \$20,000 taxes collected from the ratepayers in the area of the new town the township only returned \$2,000 as an expenditure within its bounds.

A bill passed the committee without opposition cutting the terms of the mayor and council of Chatham from two to one year. The city asked for the legislation because there is no interest in any election except when there was a contest for the mayoralty. The bill also advances the date of the municipal elections in Chatham from first Monday of November to the first Monday of December.

A bill to allow Windsor to have a recreation commission to raise funds up to half a mill on the tax rate for expenditure by the commission on playgrounds, etc., in the city, was passed by the committee. The committee thought counsel should not delegate a commission to spend ratepayers' money. The people of Windsor must vote on the scheme before it will be allowed, according to the terms of the bill. The bill was finally laid over for redrafting.

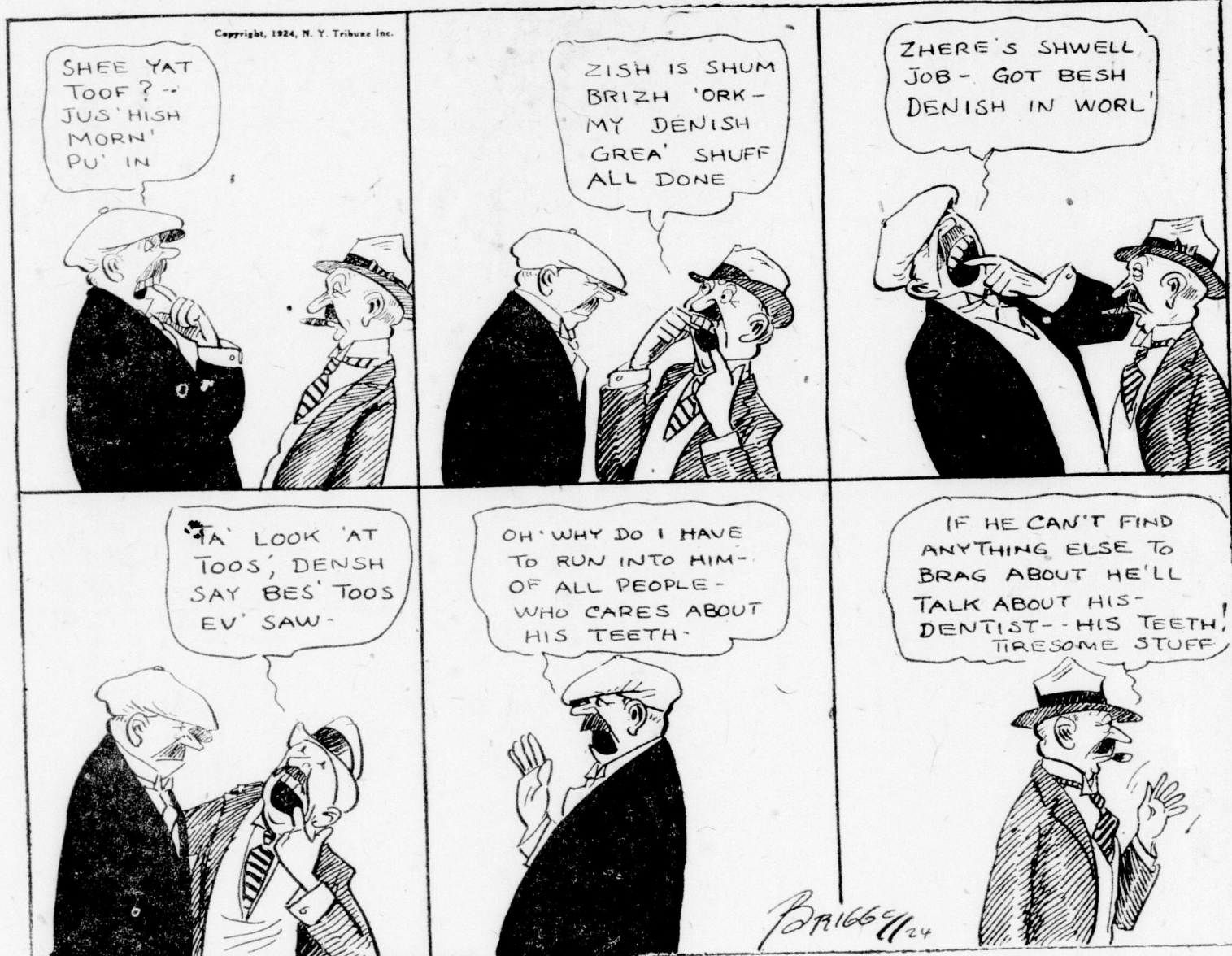

THINK SHAREHOLDERS WILL GET 100 PER CENT

Dominion Savings Company Is Now Managed by Trust and Guarantee Company.

Shareholders of the Dominion Savings Company here are likely to receive 100 cents on the dollar, according to information gained today. As a result of favorable arrangements made in transferring the Dominion interests of the Northern Life Assurance Company to representatives of Gardner, Clarke & Co. of Toronto it is expected full indemnification of Dominion Savings shareholders will now be possible.

The deficit concern is now managed by the Trust and Guarantee Company of Toronto. An announcement regarding the returns received by shareholders in the Dominion Savings is expected to be made next month.

INDIANS ARE CHARGED IN BOLSHEVIST PLOT

Eight Being Tried in Cawnpore, India, For Alleged Conspiracy.

Cawnpore, British India, March 18.—Trial opened here yesterday of eight Indians, alleged Bolshevik agents, charged with conspiring to establish a communist international organization throughout India. Four of the accused men were absent.

It was alleged defendants used workers' and peasants' organizations to attempt the complete separation of India from Great Britain, gaining at full control of the Indian national congress, with financial help from a Russian revolutionary organization.

Testimony was given purporting to show that Indian revolutionaries met at Moscow in 1921, and decided on a program of Bolshevik propaganda.

THREE CONDEMNED MEN HAVE PRISON SUPPLIES

Funds Provided by Friends Have Now Practically Petered Out.

Murrell, Williams and Topping are again feasting to a large extent on the regular jail meals. Funds provided by friends and relatives for little extras for the condemned men have practically petered out, and what little cash remains is being used in the purchase of tobacco for cigarette purposes, it is learned on excellent authority.

The three prisoners are to all appearance not worrying over the fact that they are doomed to die on April 10. The fact that appeals for new trials have been launched for Murrell and Topping may have some use to do with this attitude, while Williams is hoping for a reprieve from the minister of justice before the date set for the hanging.

CORPORATIONS ASSISTING WITH FEDERAL TAXATION

Inspector George Tambling Reports Londoners Are Actively Co-operating.

SYSTEM OF RETURNS Explains Necessity of Citizens in Every Position Preparing Statement.

Active co-operation is being received this year by the income tax department here from the London district corporations and other business firms in the filing of the necessary forms as to incomes of employees, and other payments of income. It was stated today by George Tambling, inspector of taxation for the London district. These forms are very wide and inclusive, embracing everything from capitalists' dividends to even the approximate amount of the value of board and lodgings to chefs, cooks, chauffeurs and other servants who receive board and lodging as part of their pay. It also includes the stipends and salaries of clergy, together with the rental value of manses or rectories occupied by them as part of their income.

Mr. Tambling said today that the filing of the T.3, T.4 and T.5 returns at the income tax office in the Carling Block was now going on steadily. These are the first returns to be filed. T.3 includes reports by trustees, administrators or any persons acting in a fiduciary capacity or involving payment of income to any taxpayer. These, with the other two reports, must be filed on or before March 31st next.

The T.4 returns are made by employers and must contain a list of all employees receiving more than \$500 during the year, at the rate of \$1,000 a year or over, anything less than that being exempt. This form also includes professional men attached to any corporation or firm, regardless of the amount of such payment.

Covers Dividends.
The T.5 form covers dividends paid to all shareholders in Canada by any corporation doing business in Canada, and Mr. Tambling said that many American firms with Canadian branches were voluntarily furnishing these returns, although, being in the United States, they could not be compelled to.

This, that being exempt, the inspector stated, is required by the department in order to be tabulated during the 3rd of April, to enable the assessors to begin sending out accounts on May 1st. These forms are not sent out by the department, but must be secured in the usual way, from the income tax offices or from any post office. Failure to secure, fill in and file such forms on or before March 31st renders the delinquent liable to a penalty of \$10 a day to a maximum of \$50.

Many of the larger firms and corporations, said Mr. Tambling, are filing these returns early, or filing them in part, to be completed by the end of the month. This, he said, was a great assistance to the department, and redressed the liability to congestion and delay to the companies later on.

Same Obligation.
"It may sometimes be overlooked," said the inspector, "that institutions, not in themselves amenable to the income tax act, such as churches, educational, charitable, religious and social institutions, have the same obligation to supply the information as any ordinary individual or business, and are subject to similar penalties. Included in this category are persons who employ chauffeurs, chefs and other servants where payments in the case of such employees who are paid weekly stipends with room and board, or

allowance for maintenance is included in \$1,000 or more per annum, this must also be reported with an estimate of the value of the food and accommodation supplied.

The same rule applies to bank managers and employees living in bank premises, or clergy occupying manses or rectories as part of their stipend, clergy being subject to income tax just the same as everybody else.

As to the general individual income taxpayer, he is given until April 30th to make his returns, payments being made as in previous years, the forms are already available at the head tax offices or post-offices.

THREE MEN AND WOMAN COMMIT SUICIDE IN N. Y.

Young Woman Tries Death by Poison—One Jumps From Bridge.

New York, March 18.—Three men and a young woman committed suicide yesterday, and a girl drank poison in an attempt to kill herself within the space of a few hours.

Depressed by the feebleness of old age, Frank Jaeger, 32, slashed his throat with a knife.

"I want to be with my husband," said the girl, "Good-bye everybody!" was the note left by Mrs. Mary Krause, 48, after locking herself in a bedroom and turning on the gas.

An unidentified man about 35, leaped to his death from the center span of the Brooklyn bridge.

Miss Lillian Kurylan, 22, attempted to commit suicide by drinking poison.

A middle-aged, well-dressed man, shot and killed himself as a patrolman ran to stop him. The only identifying mark was that of a Boston suit manufacturer.

GASTON VIDAL RESIGNS FROM OLYMPIC BODY

Protest of the Members Due to Representation On Voting.

Paris, March 18.—Gaston Vidal, under-secretary of state, along with four other members of the Olympic committee, has resigned from the committee for the same reason that caused P. J. Mulqueen, Toronto, chairman of the Canadian Olympic committee, and other Canadian representatives, to resign from the committee.

The protest of the Canadians and the resignation of the five members of the Olympic committee were on the ground that the representatives of the more important sports, such as hockey, football, rowing and boxing, should have more votes on the committee than the representatives of non-Olympic sports; also that the points awarded to the victors in sports, such as the four mentioned, should be greater than those awarded, for instance, to the individual winner of the skiing contests of the four best skiers winners from the Estonian republic, Baltic states.

MEXICAN WAR MINISTER TO SUPERVISE NEW MOVE

Veracruz, March 18.—The minister of war, Francisco Serrano, arrived yesterday at Santa Lucracia, it is officially announced, to direct the campaign against the rebels. The advance of the federal general, Topete, has reached El Burro, 90 kilometers from Santa Lucracia. As soon as the federal forces reach the city, the rebels will be forced to retreat.

Reports indicate that the battle in the vicinity of Puerto Mexico, has been discontinued. The federal reinforcements have been sent to the city.

MANY OF LONDON'S EDUCATIONALISTS WILL GIVE TALKS

Ontario Educational Association To Hold Convention in Toronto, April 21-24.

TWO SECTIONS

London will be strongly represented at the annual convention of the Ontario Educational Association in Toronto on April 21, 22, 23 and 24, according to a copy of the program received in the city. More than ten papers will be given by members of London's teaching fraternity, in addition to which many London pedagogues will preside over the various sectional meetings.

The convention will be held in the University Buildings, Toronto, and will be divided into sections, each one dealing with a certain phase of education. Many London teachers and officials will attend. Following is a list of the Londoners speaking, together with their subjects:

John Dearness, M. A., will speak to the spelling reform section on "The Liberal Attitude of the British Authorities Towards Simplified Spelling in the Schools," and also to the primary section on "Primary Reading."

Mr. Dearness is a member of the Normal School staff.

Marcus M. Sims, attendance officer, will speak to other officers of the province on "Practical Problems for the Attendance Officer."

H. B. Beal, principal of the Technical School, will address the members of the urban and secondary trustees' section on "Vocational and Industrial Changes."

"Lesson Plans," is the subject of an address to be given to the members of the affiliated model school teachers section by Mr. Clark, A. B. Paed., Normal School. Miss E. A. Knott and Miss Z. Pawkes, both London teachers, are president and secretary, respectively, of this section.

In the musical section, London is represented by E. W. G. Quantz, who is on the executive committee, and no address will be given by local representatives.

Tells of Experiments.
J. A. McEachern, B.A., Normal School, will speak to the members of the training section on "Experiments in Teaching History by Projects."

William Prendergast, principal of the Normal School, is secretary-treasurer of this department. In this section, he will speak to the same section on "The Written English of the Teacher in Training."

"Methods in Typewriting" is the subject chosen by J. A. Dickinson, Technical School, for an address to the commercial section. C. M. Trace, also of the Technical staff, is a member of the committee in this section.

Professor V. T. Tamblin, Ph.D., will give an address on "Recent Developments in Shakespeare Study" to the college and secondary school departments.

In the primary section, addresses will be given by Dr. E. T. White on "Arithmetic in the Primary Grades"; "The Bible Memory Course in the London School"; "Primary Reading" by John Dearness, and "Books for Children" by Miss L. Gahan, librarian at the Normal School.

All the officers in this section are from London. Miss Cora McNaughton, Miss Isabel Carson and Miss Christina M. Howie, being president, vice-president and secretary, respectively.

Officers in other sections from London are Miss Bapty, kindergarten section; S. R. White, Technical school, and Miss M. J. Craig, household science committee.

W. H. T. Mooney, formerly principal of the college, is president of the college and secondary departments.

HARLEY DECLINES TO CALL MEETING OF COMMISSION

Vice-Chairman Believes Sir Adam Should Be the One To Act.

WENIGE DIFFERS

Frank Harley, vice-chairman of the London and Port Stanley Railway Commission, and Mayor George Wenige, conferred this morning with reference to the latter's complaint that no meeting of that board had been held this year, as reported at last night's session of the city council. After consultation, an attempt was made at noon to get in touch over long distance telephone with Sir Adam Beck at the hydro building in Toronto to see if he would call a meeting for Monday next.

Declines to Call Meeting.

Commissioner Harley declined to accede to the mayor's wish and call a meeting upon his own initiative as vice-chairman of the commission. While acknowledging that the commissioners have not held their inaugural session this year, Mr. Harley felt that it was not incumbent upon him to call a session while the chairman was up and around.

Mr. Harley reminded the mayor that much sickness has been noted among the commissioners this winter, and reported that the mayor, Mr. Richards was now under the weather with an attack of influenza. The mayor insisted that a meeting should be held just as long as three of the five commissioners were available.

Commissioner Harley thought that regular meetings should be called as authorized, without making any inquiries to see who would be present, and if a quorum was not available, the meeting should be cancelled in the regular manner.

Election of Officers.

Subsequently questioned by The Advertiser, Commissioner Harley said that the proposal to elect officers of the railway who were not residing in London, as asked at last night's session by Chairman Douglass, of the finance committee, had never been broached for discussion since he had become a member of the commission, he stated.

As no inaugural session of the commission has been held this year, according to the mayor and Commissioner Harley, it will be necessary for officers to be elected when the session is staged. From present indications, Sir Adam Beck will be re-elected chairman, a post that has been his since the electrification of the road.

Buttons Galore Is New Style

Paris Dressmakers' Latest Edict Produces Some Dazzling Results.

Paris, March 18.—Buttons, buttons, nothing but buttons, appears to be the spring style of the tailored suit, coat and dress. There are probably several hundred miles of buttons on the clothes shown in Paris dressmakers' windows. In many cases these buttons are pure decoration, but there are occasions when they are put to some use.

Button embroidery is probably the most novel use made of them. Colored buttons are sewn into a design and connected by a chain stitch. At times such embroidery is splashed all over a frock or coat but more frequently it appears on pockets, collars and cuffs.

There is a certain tendency also to shorten the skirts in some cases to as much as 18 inches from the floor. Generally, however, the garments fall to a point four or five inches above the ankles.

POLICE ARREST SUSPECT IN TRIPLE MURDER CASE

COMMITTEE FACES INSURANCE TASK THIS AFTERNOON

Threat To Increase Rate On the City Schools Will Be Talked By Board.

MANY FIREPROOF

A meeting of the special committee on school insurance will be held this afternoon in the rooms of the board of education. The amount of insurance to be maintained on London schools will be determined by the members. The majority of the public schools at the present time are only insured for about 30 per cent of their value, and it is not expected that the amount will be increased. In addition to this, the board faces a new situation in insurance. The various companies with whom the insurance is placed have decided that they must have an increase of 25 cents on the hundred dollars, owing to what they claim is inadequate fire protection and on premiums carried by the board. This means an increase of \$3,500.

The companies state that the reason for this is that there is only one line of water main from Springbank to the city, which they consider too great a risk. All the modern schools are fireproof, and a great many of the older schools have either been so remodelled or insured that the risk is not thought by the board to be serious.

She is survived by her husband, Charles Evans, five sons—Charles of Detroit, Ellis of Manitoba, Walter of Saskatchewan, Fred of British Columbia, and John of Ontario. A Kibbourne of Stratford is a sister.

BULGARIAN BUDGET SHOWS SURPLUS IN '24

Sofia, March 18.—The Bulgarian budget for 1924-25 as introduced by the minister of finance, shows an estimated surplus. The receipts are placed at 6,223,000,000 leva (1,201,625,000 Canadian dollars at the normal rate of exchange) and the expenditures at 6,222,000,000 (1,200,846,000). The minister announced that no deficit was incurred during the financial year ending this month.

KING GEORGE DECIDES NOT TO ENTER YACHT

London, March 18.—King George, who is a keen yachtsman, announces he has decided "with the greatest regret," not to race his big yacht Britannia, this evening, in the regatta of lack of competitors in her class. He will, however, commission her for cruising purposes during the Cowes yachting season. It is recalled that the King laid up the yacht in 1923 for reasons of economy, but had her thoroughly overhauled in 1923, when, in great racing trim, she won eleven races, six seconds and one third of twenty-six races. This was the Britannia's thirtieth season.
