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BULGARIA'S SURRENDER

A deal of importance attaches to Bulgaria's request for an armistice and its being granted.

At first it was obscured by the statement that Premier Malinoff had acted alone and on his own responsibility and that his playing a lone hand would result in a discovery of his action and a possible revolution in Bulgaria.

Later reports showed that Bulgaria was not merely seeking a breathing spell but was earnestly desirous of making peace. King Ferdinand, commonly known as the "fox of the Balkans," was behind the move, hoping to save his position and his dynasty.

Bulgaria has practically had seven years of war. Before the world holocaust, he attacked Serbia, over the spoils of a still earlier war in which they were comrades. After 1914, it was not at first clear whether King Ferdinand would side with the Allies or with the Central powers. There was then current a story that for a \$100,000,000 and certain territory, he would throw his lot in with the Allies. A refusal led him to make common cause with the Central powers.

Ferdinand has undoubtedly observed the trend of events in France, has seen his troops driven back by Entente forces in Serbia and the defeat administered to the Turks. He has rightly assumed that the better he obtained terms, the better his country would fare in the final settlement.

His action was hastened by the fact that his armies are exhausted and were disintegrating before the Allied troops, while his people were economically nearing the end of their powers of assault and resistance.

It has been officially confirmed that the Allies have conditionally accepted Bulgaria's plea for a truce. The principal conditions are that it give the Allies control of its railways; disband its army now under arms; that it completely break off relations with Germany, Austria and Turkey and to give Allied forces free access to, in and from Bulgaria; with the final adjustment of territorial questions left to the main peace discussions. Bulgaria has accepted to the terms of the Allies and is thereby eliminated from the

Turkey May Throw Up Within Week

SULTAN GROWS TIRED OF THE DOMINATION OF THE FOE.

London, Sept. 30.—The opinion held here that Turkey will almost immediately follow Bulgaria's course and retire from the war was confirmed today by Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer, who in a brief reference to the Palestine campaign in his speech at the Guildhall, said that "something more is to follow."

With Bulgaria out of the fight Turkey is cut off from her allies and because she is entirely dependent on them for munitions, having no factories of her own of any importance whatever, could not continue for more than a month or two at the longest.

Before End Of Week.
Persons close to the ministry to-day expressed the belief that Turkey will sue for peace at once, possibly beginning the end of the week.

Bonar Law said in his speech "The magnificent success of our armies in Palestine has resulted in the extinction of a greater part of the Turkish army, but something more is going to follow."

Fire of Hun Rule.
Geneva, Sept. 30.—That Turkey has demanded money from Germany, threatening to break connections if it is not forthcoming, was reported here today.

It was said that a recent diplomatic conference in Berlin the Turkish grand vizier, Mezier, requested a loan, demanding cancellation of previous Turkish credit with Germany.

The sultan, according to advices, said to Mezier, before he went to Berlin: "I am tired of German domination over Turkey; get prompt satisfaction for our demands or leave Berlin immediately."

Austria Talking Peace.
Amsterdam, Sept. 30.—A proposition that the president and vice-presidents of the Parliament of Belgium and neutral states shall be invited to meet for an unbinding discussion of the basis of peace has been introduced in the Lower House of the Austrian Parliament. The motion, says a Vienna message, was introduced by Herr Neumann, a Liberal deputy.

It would empower the president of the Chamber of Deputies to convey the invitation to the Parliaments of the belligerents and of neutral states. The meeting would be held at a place agreed upon.

Marquis Kimochie Saionji, former Premier and president of the Constitutional party has been commanded by Emperor Yoshihito to form a Japanese Cabinet in succession to that headed by Field Marshal Count Terauchi, recent resigned.

Five members of the staff of the Philadelphia Tachibana on trial in the Federal Court here, were found guilty late today of conspiracy to violate the Espionage Act.

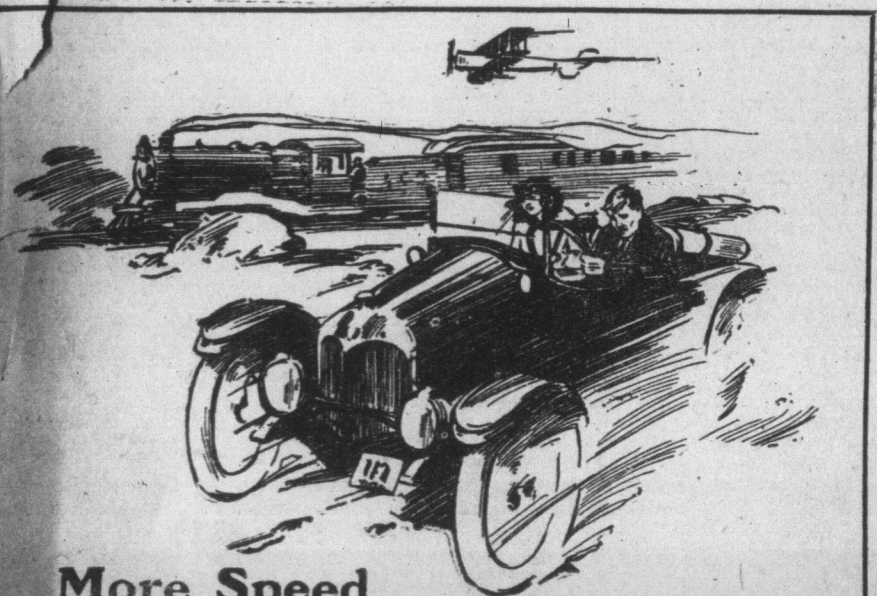
