Cloud Burst At

Nearly Half a Million Dollars Worth of Damage Done.

Jacksonville, Fla., May 14.—The rain which had been falling incessantly since yesterday about daybreak, assumed almost the proportions of a cloud-burst, and when the citizens prepared to leave for their places of business many of them found their homes completely surrounded by water. Many were driven from their residences or forced to seek temporary quarters. In all, as much as one square mile of the town was under water, and railroad property suffered water, and railroad property suffered great damage. The city is in total dark-ness tonight. The water was a foot deep in the electric light power house. The damage to this plant, which belongs to the city, is estimated at \$3,000. It will take probably \$30,000 to put the streets and bridges in repair. The railroad suffered losses probably amounting to \$100,000. The losses of individuals cannot accurately be estimated.
