**ALLEGED MURDERER MAKES HIS ESCAPE** 

Man Who Shot Another at Keremeos Gets Away Free

Shuswap, B. C., Nov. 1.-Hines, the nan committed to stand for the murder of Nelson Chance, at Keremeos, walle in charge of Constable Gardom, of Enderby, on his way to the jail at Kamloops, escaped from train here and took to the hills south of town. Re-

mitted for trial was the shooting of Nelson Chance at Keremeos on the morning of the 21st. The story of the crime as developed at the preliminary earing was that on the evening of the 20th, several of the men about town sat into a game of stud-poker, at Kirby's hotel, Keremeos. Hines, who was a stranger to all the players, was cashier. The game continued until 12 o'clock, when a pal of Hines, by the name of Ed. Wilson, came in. Hines turned to him and nicking some money. turned to him, and picking some money up out of the cashier's box, said "Here, Ed., here's the money I owe you." He then paid for a drink out of his own money, remarking it ought to be enough to pay for the use of the money for the time better. for the time being. The game then went on until 3 o'clock, and then broke up. When the players then went to Hines to cash in, he said: "Boys, I have no money, its all gone."
