The deceased leaves to mourn his wife, one son and one daughter. The son is Wm. W. of Ontario and the daughter, Miss Christina of Campbellton. One brother Chas. W. of Vancouver also survives, the second brother William, the well known lawyer and former M.P.P. having died some years previous.

The funeral, which took place at the deceased's gentleman's late residence

largely attended. The floral offerings were numerous and beautiful. The Presbyterian choir lead the singing. The pall-bearers were: Messrs. Peter McLean, G. E. Asher, Fred G. Kerr, A. D. McKendrick, James Jardine and C. T. Cool.

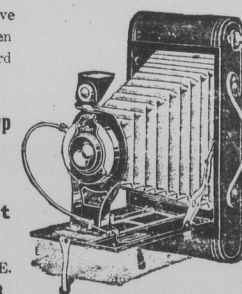
