## RESTIGOUCHE BANNER COUNTY IN PROVINCE

Leads All the Counties for  
the Second Week in Men  
Enlisted.

More than Alford Number  
Enlisted Here.

Restigouche once having got the  
lead in recruiting will be hard to shift  
from that position. Last week we  
again led the province with 22 recruits  
and this week we will be at or near  
the top and it is hoped that the good  
work being done here will be copied  
all throughout the province. When re-  
cruiting for the 132nd Battalion first  
started, we set ourselves out to raise  
this battalion in thirty days, and  
Campbellton's or rather Restigouche's  
share was to be 250 or 300 men.

Thanks to the good work done in  
Dalhousie we are within measurable  
striking distance of that number and  
yet our resources are not depleted.  
An extra spur was put on this week  
and on Monday 15 recruits were signed  
on here and 13 in Dalhousie. This  
good start was followed up in Camp-  
bellton by the enlistment of 10 on  
Tuesday, 6 on Wednesday and 3 up  
till to-day at noon. This gives us a  
total of 34 and with other two days  
go we should be well up to last week's  
mark.

The other counties will require to  
get a hustle on to fulfill their share of  
the bargain to raise and equip the  
132nd by the first of January, but it  
can be done by everyone taking a hold  
and doing all they can to further the  
work of the recruiting officers. Up till  
noon today we have now on the strength  
of A. Company in Campbellton 250  
men and in Dalhousie 57, making a  
total of 307 men.
