In Lloyd and all others who are servants of the people must be taught the same lesson. Orangemen are law observing citizens, and it is not likely that they will allow themselves to be fed saide on this question. As much as any other body are they interested in the maintenance of discipline in the public services, and they cannot afford to uphold a member of their order who thinks that because of his membership he can defy constituted authority. Any man who gets that idea in his head is troubled with over-rich blood, and the public can well adford to dispense with his services.
