Corn Growers Association

The Agricultural Societies and the Hanna Trophy was the topic for discussion at a meeting of , the Officers and Directors of the Lambton Corn Growers' Association which was held in the Agricultural Office Petrolia, on Friday, May 26th. A motion was passed to allow the three highest competitors in each Agricultural Society Field Crop Competition, where corn was one of the crops grown to complete for the Hanna trophy, providing they are members of the Lambton Corn Growers' Association before July 1st of each year. These fields will then be re-scored according to the Hanna competition score card. A second motion was passed allowing all Farmers' Clubs to enter for the Display trophy by having at least paid up members previous to the date of the Corn Show. This first motion widens the scope and competition for the Hanna trophy. All farmers growing corn for Field Crop Competition should see that their field is entered for the Hanna trophy.

Mr. G. G. Bramhill, Secretary of

the Association, tendered his resignation, which was accepted on condition that he act as Honorary Secretary to the Association. His successor as District Representative, Mr. W. P. MacDonald, was elected as Secretary of the Association. Owing to the lateness and backwardness of the season, corn planting will be later this year than usual and very little of the corn land will be in the condition desired at planting time. This should not cause a falling-off of entries for the competition as these conditions are general in all communities. To meet these conditions, a motion was passed that entries for the Hanna trophy be held open until July 1, 1916.

Lambton County Livestock Breeders Organize

The enthusiasm which prevailed at the "Get-Together" banquet held on March 1st, in Petrolea by the live stock breeders of the County and their friends resulted in the Organization Committee meeting in Petro-lea, on Friday, May 26th and organizing the Lambton County Livestock Breeders Association. This organization will have a large and useful field in which to work in Lambton County. All the leading breeds of livestock are well represented in the County and we predict a great future for the livestock interests of the County through the working of the Association. We have only to look to what the Corn Growers' Association and the Vegetable Growers' Associations have done and are doing or their respective interests in the

With the same enthusiasm the livestock interests of the County will be on a firm basis to add one more industry for which the County will be noted, namely, pure-bred livestock.

The object of the Association will be to promote the breeding of highgrade pure-bred cattle in Lambton County and to aid its members in buying, using and selling first class animals. The Association will hold Annual Dispersion Sales within the County. The Association will work with the various other agricultural organizations within the County to further the interests of agriculture and to so improve conditions that more and better livestock will be shown at our Agricultural Fall
