WELLESLEY AND RAILWAY CONNECTION.
The Wellesley Maple Leaf takes the following view of the situation, as it affects that portion of the county:

"With the prospects of having electric railway connection to Preston, Hespeler and Galt, the Berlinites are highly agitating for the extension to Wellesley. Whether right or wrong, the people in this section show a strong preference for a road running south which would connect them with the proposed electric sugar factory at Baden, then pass on to New Hamburg, Dundee or Plattville, to the C. P. R. at Galt. But the people to the south are showing a lethargy in the matter. While a strong committee has been formed here to further the interests of railway connection, no move whatever has been made by Galt at any of the points between there and here. There can be no doubt of the immense benefit such a road would be to towns along its path; but it takes push—yes, and an early push—to accomplish this scheme. The hustlers of Waterloo's county town have plenty of that useful commodity, and if the others stand round on one leg meditating a little longer, Berlin will grasp the ripe cherry. It's your move, Galt!"

If Wellesley waits until Galt citizens take an interest in their railway needs it will be a long time without the desired connection. There would not be sufficient trade to be obtained by Galt business men from the north-western part of the county to warrant action on their part. Wellesley township should look to the county seat for relief, for here is where it will come from. The scope of the Berlin and Preston company takes in Wellesley and next year is likely to witness an extension in that direction. Hold your horses, neighbors!"

The sudden announcement of the postponement of the coronation just on the eve of the ceremony has caused the utmost consternation among the people. There is no previous instance where the coronation of a monarch was postponed, except in the case of Edward VII, who was never crowned. In the early days a King was crowned as soon as the succession devolved upon him or his the earliest possible delay, this was, of course, owing to the fact that a King was not considered a sovereign until he was crowned. That our sovereign, King Edward, should be stricken down at such a time by an ailment which not only rendered him incapable of performing his duties, but created such alarm for his life, is little short of an imperial calamity. A world-wide sympathy goes out to His Majesty and to his universally beloved Consort Queen Alexandra, in this disappointment which has caused the King, under ordinary conditions was not looked upon as a good subject for operations, and though His Majesty passed successfully through the ordeal, it is believed that four or five weeks must elapse before he will be able to undergo the arduous labors of the coronation ceremonial, therefore, no date can yet be indicated for carrying out the coronation. "God Save the King" is the prayer of the Empire today, and we are sure that this country will join with an earnestness befitting the occasion in the prayer of our National Anthem, the words of which now lend a new and special meaning.

TWO MORE PROTESTS.
West Hamilton and Sturgeon Appointed Agents—North West Conservatives Have Paid \$1,000 Into Court.

Toronto, June 28.—Election protests are commencing to arrive at Osgoode Hall, now, notification of who more have been received yesterday, namely, Stormont and West Hamilton.

As regards the latter place, Mr. W. A. Logic, barrister of Hamilton, representing the Liberal interests, was at Osgoode Hall yesterday morning to find out where he should file a protest against the return of John S. Hendrie, the Conservative member-elect. It appears that the act as amended requires the protest to be filed with the local registrar, but there is no such office at Hamilton. The petitioners against the return of Mr. Hendrie are John Craig, Thomas A. J. Early and W. S. Moore.

Subsequently the Court of Appeal met to consider the case, and that body finally passed a ruling directing that protests in all such cases shall

be filed with the deputy clerk of the Court, where there is no clerk, as called for in the Act.

A protest has been filed also against the return of William James McCart, as member for Stormont. Mr. McCart was elected in the Liberal interest, Mr. John McLaughlin, the de facto candidate, claims the seat for himself.

The appeal against the return in Hamilton was heard on July 12 at 11 a.m. Mr. Justice Oiler will hear the appeal.

By consent, the appeal against the return in East Middlesex was dismissed this morning by Mr. Justice Oiler without costs. Mr. Charles Mass appeared for the Hontledge and Mr. Eric Armour for Captain Robinson.

The necessary deposit of \$1,000 in connection with the protest in North York against the return of Hon. E. J. Davis was paid into Osgoode Hall this morning by Mr. Eric Armour.

OTTAWA PAINTER KILLED.
Bicycle Breaks a Toronto Girl's Thigh—Miss Martin, Minor, Died From Fall on Thursday.

Alexander Martin, who fell down a flight of stairs at the Canada Life Building at Toronto, Thursday, died at noon Friday from concussion of the brain. He was a miner.

Sarah Fletcher, of Toronto, while crossing Bay and Adelaide streets Friday evening, was knocked down by Erskine Dewar, a bicyclist. She sustained a fracture of the hip.

William Curtis, about 60 years of age, married, but no family, was killed by his legs sawn off at the knee by a circular saw in Edwards' mill at New Edinburgh, near Ottawa, Friday.

Frank Sauriol, an Ottawa painter, aged 30 years, fell from a ladder to the stone pavement, a distance of about 12 feet, Friday, and suffered fatal injuries. He died four hours later.

The London Society of Arts will present a silver medal to W. T. R. Preston for a paper read before the society some weeks ago on "The French-Canadian artist and their relation to the crown."

It is stated at Ottawa that Hon. W. S. Fielding was tendered a knighthood in 1897, and that the offer was renewed recently, but the Minister of Finance declined the honor on each occasion.
