We have no ob jection to giving space to any one who wishes to discuss the question in our columns, as we are always willing to afford such an opportunity to any person who has anything to say on matters of public interest, or which in any way affects the welfare of our town or county. At the same time we do not care to assume the responsibility of advising such an important step as incorporation for this town, under present circumstances. A good many of the towns of the province, some of them not even as large as this one, have adopted incorporation, and so far as we are aware only one of them became dissatisfied with the change and wished to go back to the old order of things. That one, if we remember correctly, was Parrsboro. That town, after a few years' trial of incorporation, petitioned the legislature for an act

ation, preditioned the legislature for an act permitting a return to the first condition of things, which, however, was not done. It is true that some things can be said in favor of incorporation. It gives a town, or ought to give it, local self-government. It enables the people of any town to have di-rect and immediate control over the taxes they themselves pay, whereas under the pre-sent system these taxes, or a good part of the municipal council. Under some circum-stances this might be a matter of grave im-portance. With us, however, such is not the case, as our municipal council has never shown the slightest disposition to deal un-fairly with this town, or to deny us any rea-sonably request. While, therefore, this is the case, while every interest of our town can be properly and effectively looked after under the present system, it would seen to be the part of wisdom to let well enough alone. The sal-aries of certain officials, the expense of town elections, meetings of council, and the thou-sand and one other things incident to incor-poration which have to be paid, must of ne-cessity make this a more expensive method of carrying on the affairs of a town than where there are no such officials or expenses. These things mean heavier burdens to the taxpayer with or without compensating ad-vantages, as the case may be. Doubtless, in some of the towns of our province which have become incorporated, the advantages have become incorporated, the advantages of the change have more than compensated for any additional expense incurred. We,

for any additional expense incurred. We, however, already have many of the advan-tages, such as a water supply and the start on a system of sewerage, which other places have seemed only after incorrection

on a system of sewerage, which other places have secured only after incorporation. We have said that incorporation gives a town, or ought to give it, local self-govern-ment. As a matter of fact it does not quite do that, although there is no doubt that it should do so. The towns' incorporation act has been so amended every session since it has been so amended every session since it was first passed that it is not safe to make positive assertions as to what the law is at

present. But, of late years, the local government has taken to itself some of the powers cargo of general merchandise, and cleared again for same port on Monday with 660 given to town councils when the act was originally passed. 


