Correspondence

To the Editor of the MONITOR:

Dear Sir:—A propos the letter in your last issue re the Church of England cemetery signed "An Observer," it will interest and please him to know that about the time his letter was being penned we were holding a meeting about the very thing of which he wrote with the result that a committee was appointed to look into the matter, get estimates and report at a future meeting.

It is not an altogether simple proposition and I fear but little can be done before the Centennial Celebration. Nevertheless, the letter was timely and, we hope, will catch the eye of many, and arouse general and practical interest. Thanks to the thought of Mr. Samuel Pratt, a good beginning has been made.

An immediately pressing need is the refraining on the part of those who have been in the habit of making this spot a thoroughfare from so doing in the future. We appeal, then, for this. We have no caretaker and must depend on their sense of what is proper and right.

May I take this opportunity of calling attention to another similar spot which should be renovated and cared for. I refer to the burial ground adjoining ours to the East, where lie the remains of Capt. John Crosskill, Ann Petty, his daughter, and her husband, Thomas James.

Of this, writing in your issue of the 2nd inst, Dr. M. E. Armstrong says:—"At that time (i.e. 1836) practically the whole town site, was in bushes and alder swamps or forest, but in the course of 100 years the rest of the town site has been cleared and used for building purposes, whilst this small area, used for this early burial lot, has been neglected—being now, no man's land, and has become a jungle of briars and wild wood so that graves, stones and enclosures are hidden."

Surely, if we would fittingly honor the memory of Capt. John Crosskill, the founder of Bridgetown, in more than a passing way, it behooves us to reclaim and renovate this spot, there place the proposed tablet, and make provision for its perpetual care.

What say our City Fathers and the Centennial Celebration Committee to seriously considering this?

THE GOVERNMENT'S CONVERSION SCHEME

The attention of the holders of the five and a half per cent. war loan bonds maturing December 1st, 1922, are directed to the offer of the Minister of Finance to renew the loan on favorable terms. The last Canadian loan was placed in New York at a satisfactory price. The Minister is making his present financial operation entirely a domestic one by offering for new bonds bearing the same rate of interest, running for either five years or ten years as the bondholder may prefer. A further inducement to the investor is that he receives a bonus of one month's interest. The terms offered are decidedly favorable to the investor and it is probable that a large part of the maturing loan will be renewed. Arrangements for the exchange of the bonds can be made at any branch of the chartered banks. Holders who do not wish to re-invest will be paid in cash on the 1st December.

The watch was missing on Saturday and Benham who is only about 17 years of age, had also disappeared. A description of him was given Chief Bishop who on Monday located his man who had secured employment at Kelly's mill at Upper Granville, two miles below town. The accused was taken to Annapolis on Tuesday afternoon.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT NARROWLY AVERTED

Late Saturday night Lewis Walker and John Greenlund had a narrow escape from serious injuries when they drew their team aside to allow the passage of a big car which had just come into town and across the bridge at high speed. The car swerved to the right as they held up their team on the north side of the bridge and crashing into them broke the shafts and other parts of the carriage, throwing it against the fence. John Greenlund jumped out a moment before the impact but Lewis Walker was thrown out clear of the wagon. The horse naturally ran away but was soon captured. The speed fiend made no pause to ascertain the damage but kept on up Queen Street and turned east up Granville. This, however, does not conclude the matter. The sequel will come a little later.


