"CANADA FARMER" Office, Dec. 80th, 1867. The produce market remains firm, the tendency in prices still continuing upward.

Flour.-The market is firm, with, however, very few lots chang. ing hands. No. I superfine is held at \$7, but there are no buyers at over \$675. A few sales have been made during the past week at the latter price.

Wheat -The market has advanced since last report, and the tendency in prices is still upwards. Spring Wheat is in good demand formilling purposes, and millers ar. freely offering \$1 50 for Spring by the car load; \$1 52 has been paid in a few instances. On the street market \$150 has been the ruling price for Spring Fall Wheet is entirely nominal, no sales having been reported either on the street or by car load since our last report.

Oats-Selling only in a retail way, prices ranged from 53c to 55c Barley-Prices have advanced. The highest price ever paid in this market was paid during the past week, viz, \$1 10, at which price a few car loads sold. From \$1 to \$1 05 is now freely offered for car loads, and about the same prices are paid on the street market.
