PARISH NOTES

The Harvest Festival for this parish will be held
 on Sunday, Oct. 13th.

The Woman's Auxiliary began their weekly meet-
 ings on Monday, Sept. 30th, when a discussion was in-
 augurated as to whether more work could be under-
 taken by the branch in connection with the work
 amongst the white settlers in the North-West.

The Parish Guild will meet on Oct. 3rd, to discuss
 the organization of a Poppy Fête, or German Garden,
 in November. Money is as necessary this year as
 ever, and there is still \$200.00 to pay for the road
 assessment as well as for some needed repairs. It
 is the fixed intention of every woman in this congre-
 gation to help, and when they cannot attend the
 meetings, to make things at home, sell tickets, and
 by their interest help on the work. Plans are being
 made for weekly meetings at the Rectory, to make
 poppies and other flowers for the Garden.

 autumn it sounds the high call to work, and with a
