## PARISH NOTES

The Harvest Festival for this parish will be held on Sunday, Oct. 13th.

The Parish Guild will meet on Oct. 3rd, to discuss the organization of a Poppy Fête, or German Garden, in Fovember. Money is as necessary this year as ever, and there is still \$200.00 to pay for the road assessment as well as for some needed repairs. It is the fixed intention of every woman in this congregation to help, and when they cannot attend the meetings, to make things at home, sell tickets, and by their interest help on the work. Plans are being made for weekly meetings at the Rectory, to make poppies and other flowers for the Garden.
