perceive their most serious concern as the government's main priority.

With regard to hunger and poverty issues, there are significant sociodemographic differences between the public's global concerns and their perceptions of the government's major foreign policy priority in certain segments of society. As shown in Table 5, students, especially 16 and 17 year olds, Roman Catholics and francophones experience greater disparity between their global concerns and that which they perceive to be the government's top priority.
