DEVINE: Well, I believe two things. Recently Premier Lougheed spent three or four days in Washington talking to politicians there and that's the people that you have to visit with and they were interested as long as they understood well what we had in mind and if we initiate and if the federal government would initiate the concept of freer trade and open trade that between the two countries, I believe that they'd listen. Secondly, I don't think we have a choice in terms of that. A pragmatic decision with respect to job protection and job creation in this country. If we don't have a good solid standing trade relationship with the United States, we could lose thousands and thousands of jobs. The provision that we put in there and it just makes common sense, is if some industries need to adjust, well fair ball, let's give them time to adjust. On the other hand if you assume that the industries can stay alive in Canada without adjustment over five years or ten years I believe that's a false assumption as well and you're going to lose those jobs. So what we're saying is that major trade relationships like the Auto Pact stay in place. We open up and have confidence that we can have access to the U.S. market for years and years to come and tht's an exciting thing for us, as we see it, as well it protects the jobs that we have now that are trading in the United States and it looks towards expansion.
