HEALTH AND WELFARE—APPOINTMENT OF
EARL DAWSON

Question No. 1,784—**Mr. Coates:**

1. Has Earl Dawson been appointed to the staff of the Department of National Health and Welfare and, if so, what are (a) his duties (b) his salary?

2. What qualifications has Mr. Dawson for the position?

Hon. John C. Munro (Minister of National Health and Welfare): 1. A contract has been entered into with Mr. Dawson to act as the Western Regional Representative of the Fitness and Amateur Sport program. He will be used as liaison officer to deal with special sports and recreation problems in Western Canada. The contract provides for a salary of \$1,333 per month.

2. Mr. Dawson has a broad knowledge of Canadian Sports Development and has a great deal of practical experience in sport and related activities. He is and has been President of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association since October 1968 (acting) and since May, 1969, President in his own right. Prior to assuming the presidency he served for a number of years as one of the senior executive officers of the Association. He has also given many years of long service to the Manitoba Amateur Hockey Association. He has been involved in the bidding, promoting and organizing of a number of championships including the World Hockey Tournament that was to have taken place in Winnipeg last March. He has led Canadian delegations to International meetings abroad in connection with his duties and three times has been Canada's official representative to the International Ice Hockey Federation meetings. In Canada he has been the Chairman of the Amateur Hockey Negotiation Committee in dealings with the National Hockey League. He has served many other community interests, including the Kiwanis groups and has been an active worker in community projects.

INCENTIVE GRANT TO SPRINGER-
PENGUIN INC.

1. Has the Department of Regional Economic Expansion, under the Regional Development Incentives

Act, authorized or provided an incentive grant to Springer-Penguin Inc., Amherst, Nova Scotia, and, if so, what is the amount of the grant?

2. Who are the directors and executive officers of Springer-Penguin Inc. and what is the address of each?

3. To what extent is this company non-resident or foreign-owned or controlled?

4. What is the name and country of the known non-resident ownership in this company?

Mr. Yves Forest (Parliamentary Secretary to President of the Privy Council): 1. This information was contained in the monthly report, tabled in Parliament on the operation of the Regional Development Act.

2, 3, and 4. This information is not presently available as this corporation is not required to report under any Act of Parliament.

FEDERAL GRANT TO FRONTIER COLLEGE

Question No. 1,835—**Mr. Nystrom:**

1. Is it the intention of the government to provide Frontier College with an operating grant of \$50,000 for their 1970 program?

2. Has the government made a decision as to the amount of financial assistance Frontier College might expect in future years?

Mr. Yves Forest (Parliamentary Secretary to President of the Privy Council): I am informed by the Department of Manpower and Immigration and the Dept. of Labour as follows: 1. No. The Department of Manpower & Immigration decided to double its grant to Frontier College from \$5,000 in 1969-70 to \$10,000 in 1970-71. The Department of Labour has provisioned its 1970-71 Estimates for a grant of \$5,000 to the College.

2. No. However, beginning with 1971-72, the Department of Manpower and Immigration will assume sole responsibility within the federal jurisdiction for federal grants to Frontier College. Some financial support of an indirect nature can also be given in the form of purchases, by the Department, of training and research services under the Adult Occupational Training Act. In this connection, the Department has had many discussions with the provinces and with Frontier College in an attempt to increase such purchases, which under the law require provincial concurrence. Purchases have been relatively small, mainly for the reason that provinces consider that they can supply the training required through provincially operated institutions.
