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# CORN RALLIED AFTER A BREAK

Buying Inspired by Feeling  
That Market Had Been  
Oversold.

CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—Corn today  
was the active feature of speculative  
interest, weakened on liberal selling  
by large lot in the final part of the  
session, but fairly well on re-buying  
by those who considered the market  
oversold. Final prices were 1-3/4 net  
lower, 1-1/2 to 1-3/4 net higher, with the Sep-  
tember option showing the greatest  
change. Wheat closed 1-4 to 3-8  
lower, 1-1/2 to 1-3/4 net and pro-  
visions 1-1/2 to 1-3/4 net.

Corn started with a good show of  
strength on the continuance of hot  
weather southwest. Profit-taking  
was followed by the upturn, some of  
which was putting up big lines on  
the market. Prices eased rapidly,  
and it soon became evident that there  
was no overbidding in the face of  
naturally bullish crop conditions. A  
rallying rally in which some of the  
buyers were lifted prices fairly  
well and the close was firm.

A feature of the day was liquidation  
of September corn and subsequent  
buying that caused it to recover near-  
ly all the 2-1/4 it declined from its  
high of 2-1/4 for the day.

Wheat Crop Safe.  
Wheat eased on practical assurance  
that the northwest crop is safe and  
that Canada will soon complete the  
harvesting of a large yield. Lower  
prices also depressed the market and  
the bear factor was the falling off  
of export call. It was said that  
the export call was the poorest of the  
week to date. Liquidating by holders  
of September was a feature of the  
week. Steadiness in corn helped  
the close and the tone was  
firm in the final hour.

It showed weakness almost through-  
out the day, due to lack of demand,  
selling by long depressed provisions.  
The demand was slow most of  
the day.
