Board of Trade Entertains Delegates From Rochester Chamber of Commerce.

That Toronto should exert her enrgles toward absorbing additional territory by annexation was the assertion last night of William C. Barry, vice-president of the Rochester Park commission, speaking at a banquet tendered the Rochester Chamber of Commerce memours by the Toronto Board of Trade at Hotel Caris-Rite. Mr. Barry's advice followed the Rochester body's automobile tour of Toronto yesterday afternoon, during which Queen's Park, the business and Riverdale districts were visited.

"There is one great danger in Toronto," said Mr. Barry, "and that is the fact that you are crowding too many houses on small lots. With all the great expanse of country surrounding the city there is no reason for this. There might be necessity for crowding the city there is no reason for this. There might be necessity for crowding in other communities, but not here. You already have done much in annexation, and the scope in that direction should be increased."

Commerce Binds Nations.

Commerce members by the Toronto in maintaining friendly relations between the United States and Canada was the subject of addresses thruaut the evening. W. P. The speaker declared the park in a city the size of Toronto as important as the home. He cited the fact that Rochester had \$500 acres of parks, costing more than \$800,000.
