WOMEN HELP TO GATHER IN CROPS

Recruiting Has Resulted in
Great Scarcity of Hired
Men.

KINGSTON, Ont., July 30.—In or-
der that farmers might have plenty
of help to run the crops, women are
working in the fields through Fron-
tenac County. The demand for men
to go to the front has resulted in a
great scarcity of farm help.

RUSSIANS RAVAGE ALL COUNTRY SIDE

Entire Districts Evacuated in
South Poland Made
Desert.

WARSAW EVACUATED?

Enemy Follows Up Retiring
Russians Without Gaining
Advantages.

LONDON, July 30.—It is believed
here that Warsaw has already been
evacuated by the Russian army, for a
report from the Austrian war office
at Vienna says, in reference to the
fighting in South Poland: "Early this
morning the Russians began to re-
treat along the entire line, devastating
all farms, even grain fields."

The Austrians and Germans speak
of storming Russian positions, prob-
ably after the Russians had vacu-
ated them. The Teutons advanced on
a front of 15 miles west of the Vistula
on the district of Chmiel and crossed
the Vistula at several places north-
west of Ivangorod.

On the Upper Bug the Russian de-
fenders of the bridgehead at Sokal
have withdrawn their front from the
south several hundred paces.

QUOTA FURNISHING DEPOT BATTALIONS

Latest Organizations Have Special
Name Attached—Major Pel-
latt Commands Eighty-Third.

It was announced by Col. W. A.
Logie yesterday that the 74th, 75th,
76th, 81st, 83rd and 84th Battalions,
for overseas service, are to be known
as "quota furnishing depot battalions,"
and that each battalion will immedi-
ately furnish drafts of one company,
or 250 men, with five officers each, to
go overseas.

Major R. Pellatt has been advised
by Col. Logie that his battalion will
be called the "83rd," composed of one
company each from the Queen's Own
Grenadiers, 12th Yorks and the 109th.

FORTY MORE CHILDREN TAKEN FOR A HOLIDAY

Great work is being accomplished by
the Toronto City Mission in providing
holidays at the lakeside for poor children
and their mothers, and yesterday the
fifth company of the season were taken
to the Fresh Air Home at Bronte for two
weeks' free holiday. The company taken
over consisted of 22 mothers and 40 little
children, this making a total of 221 en-
tertainees at the home this season.

Much satisfaction is felt among the
officials of the mission at the great im-
provement which has taken place in the
health of all those who have been for-
tunate enough to get this holiday, and the
gratitude which is expressed by all.

NORWEGIAN SHIP SUNK BY ENEMY SUBMARINE

LONDON, July 30.—(7 p.m.)—The Nor-
wegian steamer Trendjensford was tor-
pedoed and sunk today by a German sub-
marine.

The Belgian steamer Prince Albert also
was sunk by striking a mine.
The crews of both vessels were saved.
The Trendjensford left New York
July 13, bound for Bergen, Christiania,
and other Scandinavian ports. She was
a vessel of 2730 tons, net.

The Belgian steamer Prince Albert was
of 1810 tons, gross burden, and was built
at Newcastle in 1904. She was 230 feet
long, 42 feet beam, and 18 feet deep.

NEW BRITISH NOTE SOON TO BE READY

Document to U. S. Will Deal
Exhaustively With
Blockade.

COVERS GROUND FULLY

Citations of Many Kinds Made
From Range of Interna-
tional Law.

WASHINGTON, July 30.—The sup-
plemental British note regarding the
rights of neutrals at sea and within
blockade lines will be delivered to the
ambassadors at London within a day or
two. Ambassador Page advised the
state department today, and probably
will be released for publication early
next week. Whether the original note
received here last Monday and with-
held from the press, at the request of
the British foreign office, was allowed
to stand in its present form and is to
be made public, has not been disclo-
sed. It is thought possible that the
entire British argument will be set
out in the new note and the previous
communication be withdrawn.

The new note, it is understood, is
the most formidable in point of length
and scope of the entire series of com-
munications exchanged by the two
governments on this subject. It is
filled with citations and deals at length
with intricate questions of interna-
tional law. The British position on at
least two points not treated in the
original note, the detention of the Amer-
ican steamer Neches, en route from
Rotterdam to New York with cargo,
and the American caveat of July 17,
declaring the orders-in-council would
be recognized by this government as a
substitute for international law, will
be fully argued.

TO QUESTION LEGALITY OF FLAX CONTRABAND

United States Will Protest Against
German Contention in Lee-
lanaw Case.

WASHINGTON, July 30.—In the
note which the state department will
shortly despatch to Germany protest-
ing against the sinking of the Lee-
lanaw it is probable that the legality
of the German contention that the
cargo of the Leelanaw was contraband
of war will be questioned.

Flax, of which the cargo was chiefly
composed, was declared "conditional
contraband" in the German lists of last
April, but inasmuch as the April list
was promulgated as a reprisal against
the English lists, some officials are of
the opinion that it is of a doubtful
legality.

The last note to Germany on the
Lusitania case made it clear that all
measures of reprisals must be regard-
ed as extra legal per se, but it is not
believed that the application of this
doctrine to the Leelanaw affair would
materially alter the government
course.

LONDON TRAVELER LOST HIS LIFE IN LAKE ERIE
