

DOCTORS AND PATIENTS SPEAK WELL OF HOSPITAL

Employs, However, Not Very Particular as to Disinfecting — Prof. Mackenzie's Suggestions.

Yesterday's session of the Isolation Hospital enquiry, conducted by Judge Winchester, partook, with few exceptions, of the nature of a love feast. Testimonials, solicited and unsolicited, poured in from all sorts of witnesses, especially towards the end of the day.

A letter from Prof. J. J. Mackenzie of the University Pathological and Bacteriological Department was read. It said in part: "In order that infectious diseases of all kinds may be effectively dealt with by the health authorities of the City of Toronto, it is of the greatest importance that the bacteriological laboratory, at present situated in the city hall, should be much better equipped and manned than at present."

"In addition to this, the health department of the city should deposit at all the drug stores sterile swabs, prepared for taking suspected diphtheric material from the throat, so that a physician could in a few minutes obtain the swab, if called to see a suspicious case. These might be left at selected centres in various quarters of the city, when they could be sent twice a day to the city hall, or the physician himself could send the swab to the laboratory."

"In connection with this it would enormously assist the health officer with his work in a laboratory, where established at the Isolation Hospital, so that the junior assistant in the hospital could, within 18 hours, decide in regard to suspected cases of diphtheria or of mixed infections sent in."

Dr. Sheard expressed his approval of the suggestions. Hospital Attaches Testify. Rev. Dr. M. Gillivray, the first witness, was well satisfied with the treatment of a child in his house, Ruth Day, who had scarlet fever.

Mrs. Mary Woodward produced her child in court. The child had a blind eye and some scars, which she claimed were the result of scarlet fever. Dr. Sheard testified that the child was highly of the way the little one was treated. Some of them were so happy that they cried when they had to go home. T. B. Lamb and Mrs. W. A. Hughes, mother of Elwood Hughes, also spoke words of praise.

Dr. W. J. Bryans, who has lived in the hospital, and has attended patients there for twenty years, thought that a better treatment could be given there than in the patients' homes. It was difficult to instruct an ambulance in a short time, but it never became very strongly infected. It was out of the question to put anyone in an ambulance containing blankets which had lately been treated with formaldehyde. He suggested that a better plan than the sulphur fumes would be for the stretcher to be removed and disinfected with bicloride. This could be done in 15 minutes. He had always thought the city should spend a large amount of money on better buildings and wider separation of the wards. The houses should also be fenced in with a double fence.

A. Orr, E. Bedford and Richard Robertson all spoke highly of treatment accorded to patients, they had sent to the hospital. J. Hamilton, the relief driver, only ran the ambulance one day a week. He used the same methods as the others. Never Had Instructions. George Witt scrubbed floors and looked after the linen up till three months ago. He wore his ordinary clothes and never disinfected. His regular work was in the diphtheria section, but he occasionally went over to the other side to relieve one of the maids. He never worked in both sections on the same day, but he took no precautions and had never been instructed to do so. M. C. Fraser, a patient for three weeks, had no complaints. He had found everything perfect.

The enquiry then adjourned until Saturday morning at 10 o'clock, when it is hoped that a conclusion of the evidence may be reached. Dr. Sheard will then produce statistics of the cost of maintenance of the hospital. MUST IMPROVE SERVICE. Pere Marquette Railway Will Have to Provide Better Accommodation. CHATHAM, Sept. 29.—(Special.)—Mr. Dixon of the railway commission was in the city to-day in consultation with city and county officials in reference to the train service on the Pere Marquette, as a result of which that company will be compelled to arrange their schedule to provide better accommodation. There had been a collision between the Pere Marquette and the C. P. R. also may be asked to make changes at all of their city crossings, with watchmen to guard over them.

Hospital Sued Them. Mrs. J. H. McPaul thought the treatment in the diphtheria section could not be excelled. She had, while a patient, frequently visited the public wards, and found the children kindly treated, without exception. Mrs. F. E. Plumb was perfectly satisfied with the treatment of her three children.

Dr. McCollum had sent three children of his own, all at one time. He would be glad to send them back tomorrow if necessary. Formaldehyde, said the doctor, was a strong respiratory irritant, and it might be dangerous even fatal to shut a child into an ambulance which had just been fumigated with it. His opinion was that it was extremely rare for contagious diseases to be transferred by a third party.

Elwood Hughes had only been able to eat one meal during the eight weeks he was in the hospital, but he had found the institution perfectly satisfactory. Dr. Gilmore J. Steele could find no fault. The meals were good, and the linen the best in the city. Mrs. Davis, twice a patient, and a lover of children, could not speak too highly of the way the little ones were treated. U. S. General Electric Objects to Windsor Selling Detroit Power. Windsor, Ont., Sept. 29.—Mayor Hanna said to-day: "The fact that the General Electric Corporation, with all its alleged influence in the United States congress, is said to be advocating the passage of a bill to place a prohibitive duty on electric power exported from Canada to the United States, is to my mind, a pretty clear indication that Windsor's plans for the sale of Niagara Falls power in Detroit is a good thing. The General Electric people complain that the sale of Niagara power in Detroit at a cheaper rate than the city is now getting it, would ruin the \$1,000,000 investment of the Detroit Edison Company. Will not this cheap supply from Ontario benefit those who use it in Detroit?"
