of St. Catharines, Ont., being born July 1, 1848. He is an old Upper Canadian College boy, and was called to the bar in 1869. In 1891 he was elected president of the Middlesex Bar Association, and was also president of the London, Windsor, Truro and London Philharmonic Society. His public services have been in connection with his work as Canadian representative on the International Waterways Commission, the fruit of whose labors is only becoming apparent.

Sir Thos. Tait, formerly general superintendent of the C.P.R. (Ontario division), is a son of Chief Justice, Hon. Sir M. M. Tait, and was born at Melbourne, Quebec, July 24, 1864. Educated at high school, Montreal, he entered the service of the Grand Trunk in 1889, afterwards becoming private secretary to the vice-president and general manager of the C.P.R., Sir William Van Horne. Leaving the service of the C.P.R. on the completion of the Ontario & Quebec line, he went to Australia to assume charge of the government railway system there, and is now returning to Canada to enjoy a well-earned rest.

NO NEW PEERAGES.

LONDON, Jan. 1.—Much surprise will be occasioned by the absence from the New Year honors issued to-night of any new peerages. The political prophets had predicted an unusually large list of peerages, the names of the Right Hon. Richard B. Haldane, secretary of war, and others having been mentioned. Some Conservative papers have talked of the appointment of as many as twenty or thirty new peers.

The omission is susceptible of two possible explanations. Either the King would not sanction, or Premier Asquith was reluctant to recommend the creation of peers while the difficult question relating to the house of lords remained unsettled. Doubtless many Unionists will jump at the conclusion that the prime minister failed to obtain the required guarantees from the King, but it is considered more reasonable to suppose that the government recognized the futility of creating new peers while the question of the drastic reform of the upper chamber, with the possible abolition of the hereditary basis, was in the air.

Six Privy Counsellors.

The premier's list of honors comprises six privy counsellors, the most notable of whom are Alexander William Murray, master of Ellbank, the chief Liberal whip, and Wm. Abraham, a member of the house of commons for the Rhoda division of Glamorgan shire, who is the son of a working-coller, and himself closely identified with mining interests; nine baronets, among the best known of whom is Charles Wright Macara, president of the cotton federation, and twenty-five knights. The most likely to strike public attention among the new knights are Joseph Lyons, a well-known caterer for services in supporting the territorial movement, and Henry J. Wood, the orchestral conductor. Sidney Colvin, keeper of prints and drawings in the British museum, was also knighted.

Otherwise the list is not of striking interest. The rewards go to political workers, officials of various kinds, many doctors and others connected with philanthropic work. The long list of promotions in the Order of St. Michael and St. George includes the names of Lord Robson and A. B. Ayresworth, the Canadian minister of jus-

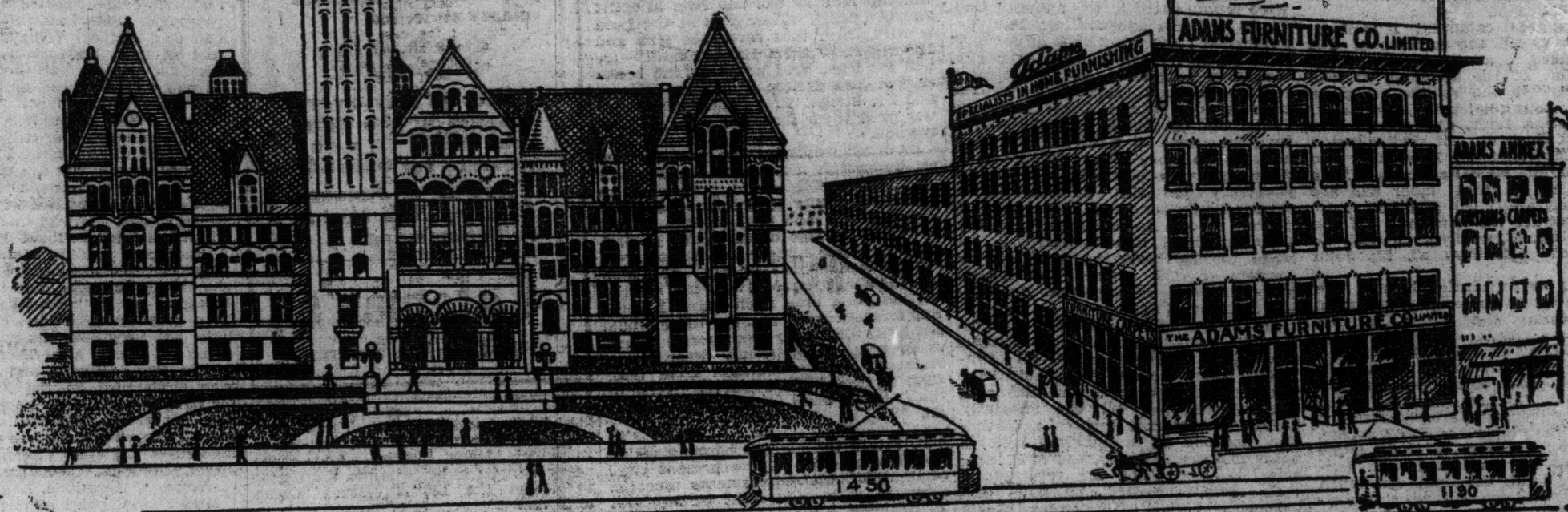
