CHICAGO, March II.—Nervousness regarding possible alarming discoveries by crop experts who had been hurried out from here to investigate rumors of Hessian ily infection in Illinois and Indiana wheat fields turned prices suddenly upward to-day. Closing figures were firm at a net advance of %c to %c. Corn finished %c to %c higher than last night. Oats unchanged to %c off and provisions down 2%c to 5c to 20c to 22%c.

Altho Hessian fly developments were no worse than the day previous, and there was a general disposition to believe that damage tales were so early in the season as to be unreliable, shorts were uneasy, and finally ran to cover rather than stand out over Sunday. Definite statements from the Chicago crop experts were expected to have considerable effect in the tracing Monday morning. Before fright as to contingencies took hold in earnest the market had been weak because of expected large world shipments, especially on account of heavy forwardings from Russia. In addition, rain thruout Southern Minnesota and more predicted to-night for the upper Mississippi Valley did away with ideas that the seed bed for spring wheat would be dry and unpropitious. There was free realizing on the advance after shorts began covering, but the setback that followed was brief, the market rising sharply, assisted by talk of a decrease in the visible supply at the beginning of next week. The close was almost at the top point of the session. May ranged from 20%c to 91%c to 91%c to 914c. With last sales %c up, at 91%c.

Local buil houses bought with considerable vigor in the corn pit. The result was to strengthen the market particularly as country sales were only fair. May varied between 49%c and 50%c, closing at 10%c.
