

DIG PROGRAM FOR GOOD ROADS

Deputation Will Ask Premier Borden on Thursday for Added Grant for Maintenance.

Two thousand miles of provincial and state highways and five thousand miles of county roads to be constructed within the next ten years is the program which the Ontario Good Roads Association is planning, and which they will outline to Premier Borden on Thursday. The deputation of about 200 members of the association and members of the city councils of Toronto and Hamilton and different boards of trade will visit Ottawa at 11:30 on Thursday morning, to lay their views before the government with regard to the Hon. Frank Cochrane's highway improvement scheme, in which federal aid is promised for highway improvement. It may be a federal grant alone or perhaps co-operation of the provinces. The deputation will place before the government their plan for control of the roads which they think should be followed. The main suggestion which the members of the deputation wish to see carried out is that an appropriation be added to the present provincial grant to the county roads system, and that this aid be extended to the maintenance as well as the construction of the roads, so that permanent results may be attained.

Major T. L. Kennedy, president of the Ontario Good Roads Association, has arranged for three special cars, which will leave the western part of the province to-morrow night. These will meet the eastern members in Ottawa on Thursday morning. The Toronto contingent will also leave to-morrow night for the capital.

MONSTER VESSELS CAN BE DOCKED IN TORONTO

Steamers as Large as Atlantic Liners Will Arrive When Welland Canal is Made.

The report that work could be commenced on the new Welland ship canal this spring, has struck joy into the hearts of Toronto business men generally. They recognize the importance of this work, which, when completed, will permit of the largest vessels on the Great Lakes docking at this port. Hamilton will also profit largely by the new waterway.

Engineer J. G. Sing, in charge of public works, could not say positively that the reports of the immediate undertaking of the work were correct, but referred to such a canal as the "greatest monumental marine staircase in the world."

There is a drop of 326 feet between Lake Erie and Ontario, he said, "and in constructing this waterway a number of locks will be necessary, six or eight, each of them 700 feet in length, and able to accommodate the largest vessels of the upper lakes. There is no doubt that it will be of great advantage to Toronto."

The new canal will mean that vessels 500 feet long, drawing 20 feet of water and with a carrying capacity of 350,000 bushels of grain, will be able to dock here, whereas at present the largest vessels that can dock here, draw only fourteen feet. Steamers bearing ore from Lake Superior and coal from Lake Erie, will, when the canal is completed, be able to land their unbroken cargoes at Toronto.

That the Welland canal project would be followed later by the deepening of the St. Lawrence River, to allow of upper lake vessels passing right thru to the open sea, was the opinion of Ex-Controller F. S. Spence, also a member of the board of Toronto harbor commissioners.

MUST GET COUNCIL'S SANCTION

Toronto Cannot Yet Take Over Portion of York Radial Railway.

Toronto has not yet been given the opportunity of taking over a portion of the York Radial Railway run by City Council. The statement was made yesterday by City Council Engineer J. G. Sing, in the statements of the Etobicoke Township Council, which has said that the city has been given the opportunity of buying the section of the road which lies in Etobicoke district, but this privilege has to be sanctioned by the council of Etobicoke.

WANTS DENTAL CLINIC

Medical Health Officer Has New Suggestion for School Children.

Medical Health Officer Hastings recommended to the board of control yesterday the establishing of a public dental clinic for the benefit of school children whose parents are not in a position to settle dentist bills. The total cost of three dental clinics at a salary of \$2000 and a nurse at \$500, and rent, etc., would amount to about \$7500. The officer suggested asking for further particulars regarding the experience of the men who would be paid the two thousand dollars per year. He thought that should students be engaged, they would be receiving too much for their services.

CHANTICLER'S SONG

Citizens Don't Like the Rooster's Early Morning Crow.

The fat rooster, who has been rendering such melodious sounds shortly before the rising of the sun, can continue to crow within the city limits. Now he has something to crow about is a deputation, being formed to wait upon the city council to ask for relief from this early morning songster, but their efforts are already nipped in the bud. City Solicitor Johnston yesterday was unable to find any ruling which invests the council to order the execution of the young roosters.

U. S. TROOPS READY FOR MEXICO.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 6.—A few hours' development in Mexico have placed the mobile forces of the United States army with marching orders and field equipment. It has been made plain, however, that the government does not intend to send more troops to the border unless the situation absolutely demands it.
