Unless properly, used in combination with manure and legume crops, chemical fertilizers are a good deal like patent medicines; their effect is temporary, and their continued use is necessary to keep the patient well. We are not condemning the use of mixed fertilizers. Under certain conditions, when the soil is "sick," or quick results are required for certain crops, mixed fertilizers may be used to advantage, but their use does not usually cure the disease; it only lessens it. Better adopt a plan of soil fertilization and soil and crop management, which shall make and keep the soil fertile.

Clean them with a soft brush, removing every particle of the dirt.


Avoid pressure in order not to injure the tubers,
