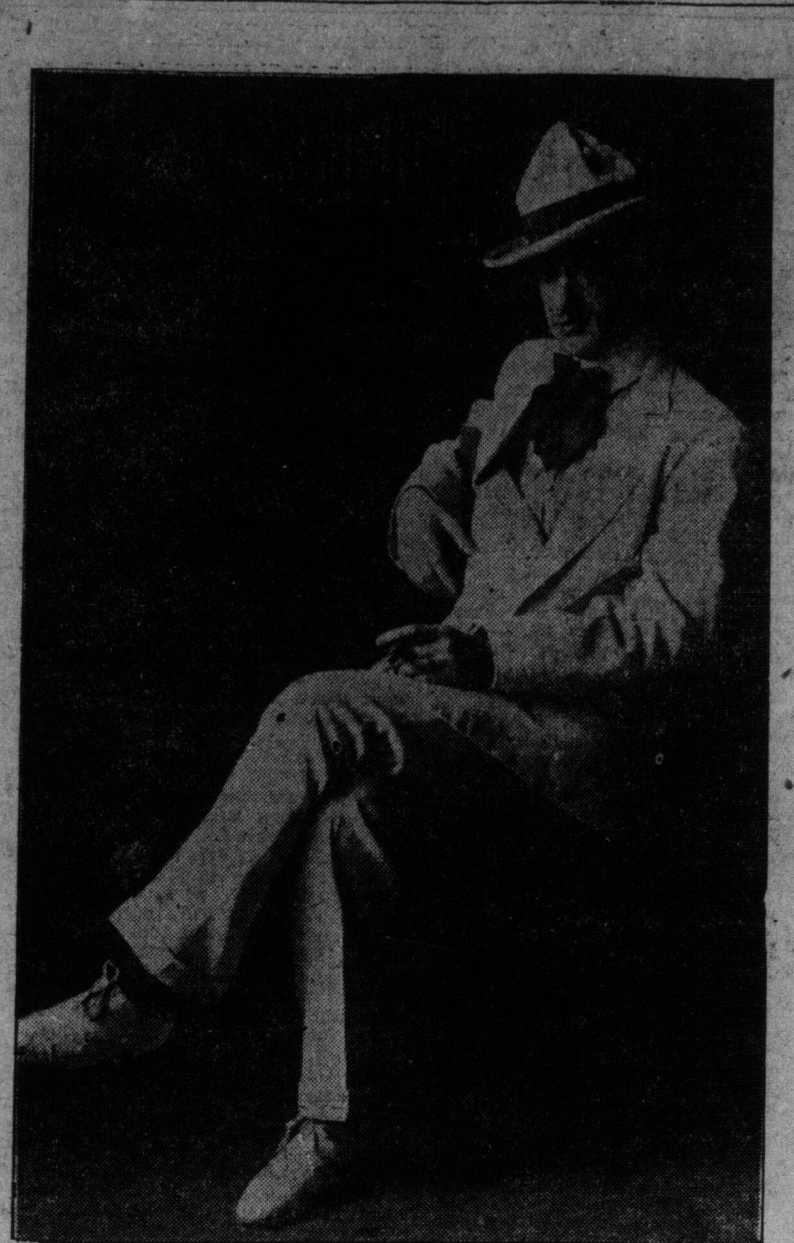

# S.A. TOWNS STILL ROCK

## QUAKING CAUSES PANIC

Additional Details of Horrors Show That Many Places Are in Ruins—Escaped Convicts Commit Crimes and Are Publicly Shot.

Buenos Aires, Aug. 21.—(3 p. m.)—The Nation to-day published a sensational despatch from La Paz, Bolivia, announcing that 2000 persons lost their lives as a result of the earthquake shocks and fires at Valparaiso, that 170 deaths from the same causes occurred at Lima, 40 at Quillota, 35 at Conchali, 11 at Petaca, 9 at La Placilla, and 5 at La Calera.

On Sunday last, Aug. 19, there was a strong convulsion at Valparaiso, which produced a further panic.

At Collina, Baruco, Polipico and Tilt, the railroad stations, stores and dwellings have all been destroyed.

Large parties of convicts, who escaped from the prisons in Chile, have been committing robberies and other crimes at Valparaiso, Casablanca and Vina del Mar, but the majority of them have been captured and summarily dealt with. Upwards of fifty have been publicly shot, and this action is exercising a salutary effect on the convicts who are still at large.

It is reported that the Chilean Government will introduce a bill to Congress, providing for the emission of \$30,000,000 in paper notes. The project aims at providing a new national loan to enable the government to meet all emergencies.

## SANTIAGO RESEMBLES CAMP

MODERN HOUSES ARE UNSAFE

Santiago, Chile, Aug. 20.—(6 p. m.)—(Delayed in transmission.)—Only now can the seriousness of the catastrophe begin to be appreciated. The greater part of the modern houses here are unsafe for habitation, and the authorities have organized a special corps to pull down the tottering buildings, which are not safe to walk in most of the streets owing to the falling debris.

The public squares and the principal avenues are crowded with people sleeping in the ruins. All kinds of animals, such as dogs, cats, and even monkeys, have been requisitioned to sleep in, or even under, them.

The night of Aug. 18 was rendered dreadful by lightning and pouring rain, the electric cables and wires snapping and a result of the constant strong earth shocks which occurred all that night, causing the greatest consternation among the people.

The pealing of the fire bells, announcing the breaking out of fires in various quarters of the city. Each shock was followed by walls and prayers from the people, who were kneeling in the rain and mud. The first great shock lasted four minutes and fifty seconds. Such a long shock had never occurred before in the memory of any inhabitants of Santiago. It caused the bells of the churches to ring in the steeples. There was a great, heaving motion of the ground. Experts say that the only thing which saved Santiago from complete ruin was that the motion was circular. The principal shock was from Valparaiso to Santiago and Meripue, with its centre at Limache. The two last-mentioned towns were destroyed, as also were Quillota and Lillafal.

Know It Was Coming.

The statement that the approach of the earthquake was announced by the naval observatory at Valparaiso two days previous to its occurrence is confirmed. The news was published in the Chilean press Wednesday, Aug. 15, the day before the earthquake occurred.

No really definite news has yet been received here from Valparaiso, except the governor's official report to the president, outlining the situation, and adding that he was currently requesting reinforcements of troops, which two days were sent to him by forced marches. The governor says that the heavy inundation of Valparaiso at night is that furnished by the burning buildings. There is a terrible scarcity of drinking water here, and difficulty is experienced in burying the bodies of the dead, owing to the want of water.

There have been a number of exciting scenes here on account of the increase in the price of meat. Finally, last by their striking native police, the mayor was called upon to restore order. As a result of the raising of the price of meat, the mayor established meat depots in various parts of the city. The prices of all articles of food have gone up, but the action of the mayor is likely to prevent any further extortion.

## STRUCK IT RICH.

Two Prospecting Find Nettle Vein Running \$1000 to Ton.

Latchford, Aug. 20.—(Special.)—One of the biggest strikes in this country was made at Trout Creek on the Montreal River last week.

Messrs. Mackenzie and Philbeck two American prospectors who had gone down on a small vein of cobalt, and last Wednesday ran into a wide vein of nickleite ore at 50-foot level, which showed values of about \$1000 to the ton. This was followed on Friday by a strike of silver ore, or of which the Bank of Commerce here have some very fine samples on exhibition.

## GREECE RECALLS MINISTER

Result of Strained Relations With Bulgaria.

London, Aug. 21.—A report was circulated here to-day, that as a result of the strained relations between Greece and Bulgaria, the Greek minister at Sofia, the Bulgarian capital, had been recalled.

Enquiries made at the Greek legation here yesterday, however, showed that the official had not been advised of the minister's recall, and that they did not credit the report.
