

Bram's Case Before the Court,

Bram's Case Before the Court, Washington, D.C., Oct. 18.—The case of the United States against Thomas Bram, convicted of murder on the high seas, and sentenced to be hanged, was heard in the United States Supreme Court to-day, on appeal of Bran from the findings of the United States Dis-trict Court of Massachusetts. Unusual interest attached to the case in view of the mystery and brutality surrounding it and the excitement it occasioned throughout the country, particularly in England. Solicitor-General Bichard and Assistant Attorney-General Boyd ap-peared for the Government and Messrs. James Cotter and Asa P. French of Boston for Bram. 


