

MINES AND MINING STOCKS

News From Several of the British Columbia Camps.

Full Details of the Silver Bell Re-organization—The Golden Cache—Steel-Rich Ore in Stenwinder—On Okanagan Lake—Nelson-Poorman Stock—On Philip's Arm—General Notes.

Full details are to hand regarding the meeting of Silver Bell shareholders, held on the 24th inst., at Rossland, for the purpose of reorganizing the company. The meeting took place at the office of Macdonald, Clute & Cronin.

The Silver Bell Company owns a valuable property on Deer Park Mountain, but after sinking a depth of some 90 feet, installing a good plant and making a wagon road to the railway, funds became low, and the original promoters having sold out the mine was closed. Some excellent ore was encountered in the first few feet of the shaft, and assays as high as \$100 obtained, but there was not enough money left to crosscut and prove the extent of this ore body at the bottom of the shaft.

The rest of the story is easily told. The company's shares were non-assessable, and only 2000 shares remained in the treasury. Every effort to secure enough proxies to hold a meeting of the shareholders was of no avail, and the stock declined so low that some of it changed hands at one-half cent.

John Harris, the president, corresponded with some of the shareholders in the east, and Capt. Currie of the firm of Currie & Kiteley, Toronto, undertook to secure the necessary proxies for reorganization. He secured proxies for some 600,000 votes, which, added to those held in Rossland, enabled the company to hold its meeting and transact business.

The result was this meeting, at which a resolution was unanimously adopted dissolving the assets of the company to Mr. Currie for the new company, which will be known as the Silver Bell Consolidated Mining Company. The new company will get shares for \$500,000, divided into 2,000,000 shares of 25 cents each. The individual shareholders of the company will get shares for the same amount.

Those who have examined the property say that with about 15 feet more of sinking and about 20 feet of crosscut, the Silver Bell would make showing equal to any mine in the camp at the same stage of development.

John Harris, William Hays and A. H. Macdonald were elected directors.

IN B. C. CAMPS.

World's Vancouver Correspondent Sends Budget of News.

Vancouver, B.C., Sept. 26.—(Special Correspondence.)—There is a great deal of mining excitement in British Columbia, at present with stories of extraordinary discoveries, which are nine-days' wonders, and then never heard of again. Last season these stories were believed by newspaper correspondents, and by the public, and as a consequence there were many bitter disappointments. A reaction has set in, and only on the most convincing proof of the existence of the stories do the newspapers commit themselves to more than a passing reference in a general way to the existence of the stock cannot be sold only after the very favorable reports of a recognized mining engineer of ability.

Very often mine promoters themselves, however, are deceived. They actually believe they are prospective millionaires, and they have found a rich little pocket of free gold on the side of some almost inaccessible mountain.

Find at Fairview.

Out of the thousand wild rumors on the streets, the following three or four reports may be taken as accurate: At Fairview a rich body of ore, showing quantities of free gold, has been struck in the Stenwinder, owned by the Winchester Company, and the camp is very hopeful as a consequence. The extent of the strike is not yet known definitely.

On Okanagan Lake, within a short distance from Vancouver, in the Okanagan District, free gold has been found, the rock running without visible gold \$475 to the ton, and a liberal sample running \$1047 to the ton. No accurate information can be got as to how much of this rock is in sight.

Philip's Arm.

At Philip's Arm up the coast a few miles from Vancouver there are eight copper-gold mines working with machinery, blocking out ore and developing. Chief of these is the Dorothy Morton. The original holders of these mines—poor men with only their wages to depend on—have sold out to millionaire corporations for handsome sums, so that the mines are a great benefit to Vancouver.

Bridge River.

In Bridge River country, where the Ida and Ben d'Or properties are situated, marvellously rich rock is coming out, but it has not been absolutely proved that the veins are of any width. The development work has not been far advanced.

Nelson-Poorman.

The Nelson-Poorman mine is received with general favor by the public, and the stock, which went slowly at 10 cents last season, is now selling at 35 cents, owing to the favorable report of Bewick and Moreing, represented by Mr. Kendall, an English expert whom British Columbians have grown to depend on. The Nelson-Poorman Company are going to simply block out ore until next summer, when Mr. Kendall says the ore is there to block and the value is there, for hundreds of thousands of dollars have already been taken out by crude methods.

Golden Cache.

The stealing of the amalgam of the Golden Cache mine is a bitter disappointment. Stockholders will not be reassured by the fact that the mine is still there, and that the series of disasters which have befallen the company since its phenomenal run of luck has tired them out. Golden Cache shares were sold at one time for 15 cents, and at this writing they have bumped back to the bottom at that figure after skyraking to \$210. However, many have great faith in the mine yet, and are eagerly buying at 15 cents. The amalgam strike is a great mystery, and many bitter insinuations are thrown out, but very apparent reason for foundation. It is the voice of dissatisfaction and disappointment.

East Buffalo Cattle Market.

East Buffalo, N.Y., Oct. 3.—Cattle—Offerings, 233 loads, including 55 loads of Canadian stockers. The market was very quiet and in consequence the market opened slow on all but the most desirable grades of butchers and the heavier kinds. There was little or no export demand, and with about 12 loads on sale, the market ruled 10c to 12c lower and prices were weak.

The early sales of the best fresh cows were at \$2 to \$3 per head higher and quite strong, and springers were strong at last week's prices. Late in the day springers dragged and cows and calves lower. Good to best month fat export steers, \$3.25 to \$3.40; good to best, \$3.45 to \$3.55; common to good butchers' bulls, \$2 to \$3.50; heifers, good to best, \$2.45 to \$2.55; fat cows, good to best, \$3.50 to \$4.00; stockers, choice to extra quality, \$4.10 to \$4.20; common to good do, \$3.50 to \$3.90; fresh cows, choice to extra, \$3.50 to \$3.90; calves, choice to extra, \$3.50 to \$3.90; calves, choice to extra, \$3.50 to \$3.90; calves, choice to extra, \$3.50 to \$3.90.

Hogs—Trade was quite active, with 120 loads on sale, but the hot weather killed several of the best. Prices were a little higher. Sheep and Lambs—The market was in a very satisfactory condition, considering the hot weather. Choice heavy lambs were in good demand and stronger, but heavy and common lambs were lower. There was a good demand for feeder lambs, which helped to support the market. Choice heavy lambs were firm on the choice rinds, and at the close all the offerings were sold.

Utica, N.Y., Oct. 3.—At the Utica Board of Trade the following sales of cheese were made: 4217 boxes large white at \$8; 150 boxes small white at \$8; 400 boxes small colored at \$8; 17 packages creamery butter at \$10; 7 packages creamery butter at \$10; 15 boxes at \$8; 32 boxes at \$7; 433 boxes at \$8; 1300 boxes at \$8; 440 boxes at \$8.

London Markets Stagnant. New York, Oct. 3.—The Evening Post's London says: "The stock markets here are stagnant today and irregular. Bravals were strong on the exchange at \$104. This rapid rise in exchange is partly due to the closing of the London market. The Americans opened dull, became better later and closed irregular and dull.

There was good buying of Portuguese, Spanish fours were strong on Paris buying. Ruffs were good, as also Grand Trunk, the latter on the semi-annual report, which is satisfactory, but features. Argentine was lower on realizations. The Paris bourse was steady and the Berlin market was quiet on tight money.
