CRIMINAL ASSIZES OPEN. Mr. Justice McMahon Addresses the Grand Jury in a Concise Manner.

His Lordship Mr. Justice McMahon opened the Criminal Assize Court yesterday afternoon, and after the grand jury had been sworn, went over the cases to come before the court, and also gave instructions to the jurors as to their duties.

As to Thomas Kennedy, one of the several men charged, the court claimed that there may be a doubt as to his aiding and abetting the offence.

The Prisoners Aid Society requested the court to bring before the jurors the question of the treatment of inmates. The society hopes to have the general hospital throughout the Province undertake the work.

FIGHTING PHILIPPINES.

American Volunteers Struck a Body of Insurgents and Killed Some of Them.

TWO U. S. OFFICERS WOUNDED. General Young Advancing in the Mud, and With Any Amount of Difficulties.

Washington, Oct. 30.—The War Department has received the following from Gen. Otis: "Manila, Oct. 30.—Detachment Bell's regiment, 36th Volunteers, reconnoitering towards Florida Blanca, West Gungua, struck body of insurgents in newly-constructed trenches. Attacked and drove enemy, who left in hands of detachment; four insurgent officers and eight enlisted men killed. Three prisoners and nine rifles. Casualties: Captain French and Lieut. Peterson wounded, not dangerously. One enlisted man killed; six wounded."

YOUNG IS ADVANCING. But the American Troops Are Having a Hard Time in Mud, and With Scant Provisions.

Manila, Oct. 30.—General Young, with the infantry, is advancing upon Cabanatuan under difficulties. The country is further under difficulties. The mud is so deep, the rations are short, and the transportation of supplies has been delayed by day and night, and the poor condition of the roads. There are sufficient stores, however, to keep the troops for a long time.

CAPT. BENGOUGH DEAD.

Was Eighty Years of Age, and One of the Best Known Men in Ontario.

Captain John Bengough died at his residence, 634 Church-st., yesterday morning. He had passed his 80th birthday on May 23 last, being within a day the age of Queen Victoria. For a year past he had been falling in health. He was an ardent social reformer, being one of the chief advocates of the single tax. He was a member of his favorite phrasen. All taxes should be raised from the land and the progress of social reforms all over the world and nothing gave him more delight than to hear of an advance movement in New Zealand, Britain or Australia. He was one of the moving spirits in the Reform Convention which met in Whitby in 1888 and nominated Mr. Oliver Mowat as a candidate for Parliamentary honors and was one of the chief stump speakers in Mr. Mowat's interest. This election resulted successfully and Mr. Oliver Mowat thus began his brilliant Parliamentary career. The deceased leaves five sons and one daughter. His sons are J. W. Bengough, the cartoonist; George Bengough, insurance agent; Thomas Bengough, official court reporter; James Bengough, mechanical superintendent of the Lumber Co., Niagara Falls, N.Y.; and William Bengough, artist, now in the Philippines for The New York Morning Journal. The funeral will take place from the residence on Wednesday at 2 p.m.
