Rev. Dr. Carman's Strong Words on Political Corruption-Education and Religion Discussed.

Political corruption in Ontario, esecially as revealed by the recent investigation, received a warm denunciation from Rev. Dr. Carman, general superintendent, at the general session of the Conference yesterday morning. He said the legislators should be iso lated, so that the people might escape contamination. Party influences led to lishonorable proceedings. It was time and lifted men up to a higher patriotic ideal. If parliament only dealt with the great questions of Sabbath Day observance and temperance reform, mach good could be done.

In speaking of the unity of the church, as exemplified by the General Conference last September, Dr. Capeman referred to the utterances of the Colonial Secretary and the new idea. man referred to the utterances of the Colonial Secretary, and the new idea of empire. The fundamental idea in building up the empire was a community of interests, and a community of sacrifice. The people of Canada were ready for that. He did not think they were building up a phantom when they spoke of a British empire thruout the earth. He did not believe that it was God's will that nations should it was God's will that nations should die, but that they were overthrown by their own iniquity. He confessed he heard a storm of cvil rolling against the foundation of our national life.

Young Men for the Ministry. There was great difficulty in securing suitable men for taking up the work of the ministry. Toronto Conference was twelve men short. The work was never so enticing. The honors or dishronors of political life were alluring, the advantages of commercial life were prominent, and pleasures were everywhere. What was needed was more spirituality. God forbid that young men should be encouraged to look to the salary remuneration, or enter the ministry for a soft and easy time, but the church, in self-respect, should see its ministers better supported. An important feature of his address was the advocacy of forming electoral leagues thruout the country to advance the temperance cause, the members of which should rise superior to party predilections. It was not desirable that the Quarterly Boards should be turned into such leagues. Rev. J. E. Starr, seconded by In-spector Archibald, moved that some steps be taken to prohibit betting at acetracks. His resolution, which was eferred to the Temperance and Moral referred to the Temperance and Moral Reform Committee, reads as follows:
"Whereas, under the provisions of Section 204, Sub-section 2, of the Criminal Code of Canada, betting, wagering and gambling are made lawful on any racecourse of an incorporated association during the actual progress of a race meeting; and whereas, the methods of gambling so legalized issue in the following results: 1. For a period of nearly four weeks in each year, including the spring and fall meetings, races are held in Toronto on the Woodbine track, and at Fort Eric for at least a period of three weeks, and also at Windsor for a like period. 2. That, at these places, for a number of weeks in each year, the public are permitted by law to indulge in gambling of the very worst kind, thereby familiarizing people with it, hardening the old, and corrupting the young and inexperienced, even, as it were, teaching them. kind. thereby familiarizing people with it, hardening the old, and corrupting the young and inexperienced, even, as it were, teaching them these methods of gambling to such an extent that, having become educated in them, their minds are so demoralized that of necessity they seek other forms of gambling are remained of the year.

3. That, owing to the evil effects of these universities of gambling, at the Woodbine, Fort Erle and Windsor, must be attributed the existence, in the large cities and towns of Ontario of places, devoted to this vice, and provided for the special purpose of satisfying the mania or desire created by these schools which are allowed to flourish by special enactment, "Therefore, we, the members of this Conference, hereby expres our strongest condemnation of the gambling permitted at these places, and would most respectfully urge upon the government of Canada to so amend Sub-section 2 of Section 204 of the Criminal Code of Canada, as to utterly forbid and pronounce as unlawful any betting, wasgering or gambling upon any race-course in Ontario, whether belonging to an incorporated association or private individuals, together with the publication of all betting intelligence in any newspaper."
