The traffic receipts of the C. P. R. for the week ending September 30 were \$509,000; for the same week last year, \$588,000; decrease, \$79,000. The Grand Trunk has completed arrangements with the Detroit Railroad Elevator Company so that grain going to New England will be transhipped from lake boats to its rail line at De-troit hereafter. The grain will be brought from Chicago in steamers and consorts stored in the elevator, and run out into cars as fast as possible.


