Hamilton, Oct. 14.—Bible study, led by Rev. Elmore Harris, B. A., opened yesterday morning's proceedings of the Y. P. S. C. E. convention, after which there were devotional exercises led by Mr. T. F. Best, of Brantford. Geo. McLeod, of Knox Church, Hamilton, occupied the chair.

After the meeting the convention met in the base-ment of Knox Church, where the local junior union had prepared a breakfast for visiting juniors, workers, and friends. Ottawa Valley Men Interview the Dominion Premier and His Aides.

[By C. P. R. Telegraph to Advertiser.] Ottawa, Oct. 14.- A delegation of lumbermen waited on Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Sir Richard Cartwright and Hon. Mr. Davies. It comprised J. R. Booth, W. C. Edwards, M.P., A. Lumsden, M.P.P., and Levi Crannell. The position of the Ottawa Valley lumbermen in connection with the new Ontario law providing for the manufacture of logs in Canada is well known. What the Ottawa men want is free lumber by the United States tariff, and to anything which will prevent this being obtained. The Ontario law will, on the other hand, they claim, be to provoke retaliation. The matter was discussed at length.
