RED CROSS AND C. W. C. A. COLUMN

It was as long ago as last November that our assistant Red Cross commissioner to France wrote thus of the French hospitals: "There is no doubt that many of the hospitals in France are much in want, and I gathered that they would have the greatest difficulty in carrying on if it were not for the outside assistance."

and now the French hospitals have almost reached the end of their supplies for the outside help, upon which they are depending, failed them at the most needy time. It is coming now, however, very late, but much better coming. It is coming right out of the pockets of the grateful Canadians, who owe their safety and their liberty to France. It is coming on July 14, the day when the heart of France is to be thrilled by the generous and substantial sympathy of those who have benefited by her suffering. Do not forget it! July 14.

Are you taking holidays this summer? No, surely not! You aren't planning to stop your knitting and your sewing are you? If you do there will surely be a barefoot boy in the trenches next winter vacation. Or there will be a hospital at the front improperly equipped, just because you did not sew for it during

the summer. The women on the farms are overwhelmingly busy in the summer, but the women in the towns and cities have more leisure now than they had in the winter. So the Red Cross and C.W.C.A. are looking for an increased supply from the towns and villages. The stream must be kept going. The home fires must be kept burning.

On July 3 the C.W.C.A. shipped the following: 3 sweaters, 2 mufflers, 11 caps, 18 trench suits, 147 day shirts, 1,000 towels, 2,154 pairs socks. Let us always keep an eye on the number of socks shipped. It is our thermometer. Let us keep the temperature up.

Ans.—"Myrtle" is very fortunate to have such a nice pattern sent for her. The same has been forwarded. I. In wartime, it seems to me, picnic menus should be as simple as possible, and I'd like to see some to encourage this idea. We can have very pleasant times and an attractive "spread" without the olive, food cakes in variety and other fancy things that we have been deeming a necessary part of the picnic. Here are two or three menus of a more simple nature: (a) Peanut butter or cream cheese sandwiches, home-made pickles, date and nut chutney, fresh fruit, tart, coffee or lemonade. (b) Salmon loaf with dressing and shredded lettuce, brown butter, sugared strawberries (may be used in glass sealers without any difficulty), cup cakes, coffee. (c) Mince and cinnamon buns cut in half and spread with butter and jam, strawberry pie with custard, coffee. One Woman's Way.
Dear Miss Grey,—The readers a lot of the readers are asking about rhubarb. I am doing a lot down and never use anything but rhubarb water. It seems to be a lot this year and I think they can have it will be wise to do all they can. Cut into small pieces, wash, then fill up with water and boil under water. It is sure good and cost nothing. Now there was a reader, "Sixes and Sevens," wanting to know how to regulate her work. As I have not seen any answer, only one, I thought I would tell how I manage on a farm. It sure was some doing, too. We generally rise from 5:30 to 6, sometimes, when the busiest time comes, a little earlier. This is a 10-acre farm and there are two men. I often lay the breakfast table before 7. The men start before 7. I get the porridge on, then I stir the bells, open windows, and off to help milk the cows. Help with the milking, two more coming in. Help separate, see to breakfast, feed the chicks while the fowls are being cleared away, wash dishes, separator, make beds, (I always like the beds done right away), come down stairs, sweep outside, get dinner on, then upstairs again to sweep and tidy. Oh, my! I should say if our rooms were not swept well once a week, and lightly most days except Sunday and Sunday. I must say I must get up in night, but I must say I printed it at night most times. I have a son for a certain amount of work. Monday I wash unless it wet; if so, I just change about and do Tuesday's work. Wednesday I clean out the spare-room and parlor; they are very seldom used, but I must collect all the same. I iron in between work from Monday to Wednesday. Sometimes I get all away by Tuesday. Thursday I clean upstairs right to the top. Friday, dining-room, kitchen and bathroom. Saturday morning I mostly bake for Sunday, for I do no more than is necessary on that day.
