U. S. TARS CLASH WITH POLICE

Twelve Men Set Upon in Santiago and Were Brutally Beaten.

Santiago, Cuba, May 1.—The conflict here yesterday between police and sailors of the Tacoma followed an orderly banquet which was given at the Cafe Leon de Oro by a party of first-class seamen of the cruiser. At 1 in the morning the men separated and twelve of them went to the Cafe Union.

They were not intoxicated. A police captain, named Lay, who was in civilian's clothes, had been watching this cafe all the evening, with seven or eight policemen to support him. At about 2 o'clock in the morning the sailors started for the wharf with the intention of boarding the Tacoma.

Capt. Lay claims that the sailors started the trouble, and the sailors claim that Capt. Lay, without any provocation, caused the disturbance. As the enlisted men of the Tacoma had been hindered by the police on their way to the wharf Ensign Brislin decided to walk slightly ahead of the party. Suddenly he heard a revolver shot, and immediately afterwards the police charged with revolvers and machetes.

Brislin received an ugly cut on the arm and was felled to the ground three times. As the crowd of seamen came up the policemen emptied their revolvers at them, at the same time attacking the Americans with machetes. A fierce fight ensued, with the result that Henry L. Lee, a fireman of the Tacoma, will probably die of a compound fracture of the skull, caused by a machete, and a gunshot wound in the right breast.

Ten other members of the crew of the Tacoma were taken to the ship's hospital suffering from machete wounds and clubbing. Not one of the policemen was badly hurt, though several of them suffered from fist contusions.

It is estimated that the United Kingdom alone manages to consume 500,000,000 matches a day, which comes out at about 12 for every man, woman and child. HERE'S ALL ABOUT THE SNIFF KISS

It and the Lick Variety Were Once in Vogue Says Student of the Subject.

Philadelphia, May 1.—That in early times the kiss was really a sniff and a lick was the novel statement made by Prof. Hopkins, of Yale University today, before the American Oriental Society now in session in this city.

The title of this iconoclastic—to springtime lovers, at least—address was "The Sniff Kiss," and proved to be an instructive disquisition on the progress of osculation in ancient India, from the time when the affectionate sniff at the beloved object of the caressing lick sufficed to express affection, down to the later period, when nothing but a full-blown kiss would serve the turn of friend or lover. Prof. Hopkins quoted copious citations from practice of animals. He illustrated the evolution of the kiss.

"Osculation proper," said Prof. Hopkins, "was preceded by a sniff and a lick stage, although after kisses became common the sniffs grew correspondingly rare." He pointed out, however, that in certain tribes along the northeastern frontier of India the old sniff kiss was still in vogue. "There was apparently a state of society in ancient India," said Prof. Hopkins, "in which kissing in this modern way was unknown. In the old Vedas we have no word corresponding to our kiss. Words for a corresponding display of affection mean, variously, touch, smell, sniff, as a cow does a calf. The fond father is enjoined on returning from a journey to sniff affectionately three times at the head of his child. In the late Vedas men have learned to kiss. Lovers are instructed to put mouth to mouth. In the books treating of love-making from a scientific standpoint we hear nothing about sniffing."

Cow and Calf Point Way.

Prof. Hopkins also referred to the lick kiss as another form of caress seemingly founded upon observation of the practice of animals. He illustrated with many learned philological observations from Sanskrit, Greek and Latin ancient lore of kissing, declaring that he hoped his paper might serve as a contribution to the history of that interesting subject. He scouted the theory that the kiss proper might have been known among the ancient Hindus, but neglected for the sniffing and licking process, declaring that there was no probability that any people once knowing the joys of osculation would put up with any inferior substitute.

"Kissing," said Prof. Hopkins, "is frequently mentioned in later Vedas, where words used leave no doubt that it refers to osculation of accepted kind. Kissing is mentioned as frequently as biting and scratching. The sniff and lick stage is over, and in later classical literature there is plenty of kissing and little sniffing."

"Although the superior advantages of a kiss as a means of expressing affection has caused it to be largely supplanted the cow and calf method of an earlier time among the populations of ancient India, more primitive methods still survive not only in parts of India, but among the various tribes of Africa."

Great Stuff for Philologists.

"The sniff and lick style of osculation seems to have grown into disfavor as society emerged from its patriarchal stage as a means of expressing affection between the sexes. Old sniff-kiss was peculiarly the domestic kiss of father and child. Lovers found it precise and formal and promptly abandoned it, relegating the sniff to the placid family relations and employing the more satisfactory contact of mouth to mouth as a more suitable vehicle for their affectionate ardor."

"The kiss, once made the vehicle of affection between the sexes, has never lost the favor which it attained, and the sniff was relegated to barbarous tribes and African savages and is now in the same category as Malay nose-rubbing or any other barbarous methods of displaying affection."

The American Oriental Society is holding its 19th meeting in the hall of the American Philological Society at the present time. Some of the most distinguished philologists from Yale, Harvard, Columbia, Johns Hopkins, and other universities, are in attendance at the sessions. At the opening session today Prof. Lauman, of Harvard, was elected president.

SONS VS. FATHERS IN SCHOOL WAR

Students at the University of Lisbon Decides to Go on Strike.

Lisbon, May 1.—The country awaited in suspense the beginning of the summer term at the universities and colleges today. A general strike of the students had been threatened, and the threat was fulfilled.

The trouble arose from the "plov-ing" of a student at Coimbra University some months ago. The students protested against the "plov-ing" and mobbed one of the professors. Seven ringleaders were accordingly rusticated. This was announced during the Easter vacation. The result today was that practically all the students of Portugal refused to resume their studies in spite of the Government's efforts to induce them to do so. The sons of the Prime Minister and of the Governor of Oporto joined the strikers.

Extraordinary scenes were witnessed at the gates of the colleges of Coimbra University, fathers attempting to compel their sons to enter. One infuriated parent drove his son before him with lusty blows from an umbrella, and was frantically hauled and hooted. Numbers of students ran away from home to avoid coercion. Others violently resisted their parents. One youth, in answer to his father's arguments, declared, amid wild applause: "Father, you are the author of my being, but remember that, above all else, I am a free citizen!"

There was conflict between the Lisbon Polytechnic students and the police, but it was without serious results. A white-headed professor, intervening in the riot, had his head and face blackened by well-aimed inkpots.

DALAI LAMA LOCATED

German Explorer Claims He Has Interviewed Mysterious Priest.

Berlin, May 1.—One by one the world's mysteries are being cleared up. A British expedition having laid bare the secrets of the forbidden Tibetan City of Lhasa, and Dr. Sven Hedin having found that the Tashi Lama, who is now the head of the Buddhist religion, was approachable, it remained to discover what had become of the Dalai Lama, the world's greatest recluse, who fled from Lhasa to the wilds of Tibet as the English approached the Sacred City. Dr. Tafel, German explorer, now claims that he found him in a Tibetan monastery at Gombum, near the Chinese frontier, and obtained an audience of him. Dr. Tafel is said to be the first European who was ever face to face with the Pope of Buddhism. The explorer says that the meeting, which occurred last September, was achieved with the greatest difficulty. He doubts if the Dalai Lama knew he was an European. His familiarity with the Tibetan language and customs, gained by many years' traveling in Central Asia, enabled him to pass as a native. He describes the Dalai Lama as a very small man of the genuine Tibetan type. He is pockmarked, and wears a small moustache. He sat upon a square platform three feet above the floor. Dr. Tafel's greetings were received without response, but the Dalai Lama condescended to exchange gifts. On retiring Dr. Tafel made a deep obeisance, which seemed to please his Holiness, who suddenly touched the explorer's head, signifying his approval. Later Dr. Tafel saw the Dalai Lama examining candidates for the priesthood. Three of these were squatted on the ground, surrounded by numerous priests. The Dalai Lama walked to and from them, questioning each candidate. If one of them answered incorrectly the Dalai Lama hastily clapped his hand over his mouth as if to prevent him from disclosing his ignorance. One who did not regard the hint refused the displeasure of the Dalai Lama, who signified his contempt by raising his foot and waving it around the offender's head.

ABSCONDER AIDED BY SMUGGLERS

Is Finally Expelled From Country on Representation of French Government.

Paris, May 1.—Fernan Boles, a book-keeper, whose manner of life caused his employers to give him notice, discovered in reading of the exploits of the runaway bank clerk Gallay that France had no extradition treaty with Greece, and therefore resolved to seek a sanctuary in Corfu, whither he fled in October, 1905, with \$27,500 from forged checks, and with Amelia Bigonville, his sister and her child.

His adventures were brought to light in the Paris courts on Friday. "I tried to be an honest man," he explained, "but as my employers prevented me, I resolved to be as dishonest as I could be." In a pretty little suburb of Corfu, handsome villas surrounded by palm trees and a world of roses, which has earned an unsavory reputation as the residence of many notorious characters from all parts of Europe, the party found a roomy villa, surrounded by a large garden, with a splendid view of the sea.

Purchased a Villa.

The landlord was a local notary, Boles

resolved to settle down, and bought the place for \$7,000. Then, supposing himself safe from pursuit, he sent his friends in Paris picture postcards, one representing himself and his companions on the veranda.

From these the Paris police found their clue. Two detectives visited the island, but one had to return to Athens to arrange for the expulsion of Boles. Despite the intervention of the French minister, the chief of the Corfu police, a friend of Boles' notary landlord, kept him acquainted for a consideration—with what took place. One pretext of delay was that the matter could not be dealt with while the Hellenic Parliament was debating the question of molesting foreigners. Operations were, therefore, postponed till Parliament rose.

Aided by Police.

As a result of a formal complaint from the French minister, the chief of the police was in December removed from his post. Boles, however, was taken to a safe hiding-place by two policemen, and afterward went to live with smugglers at Manduthio, whom he paid dearly for his food and lodging.

Unfortunately, he became so annoyed at the way he was being exploited by the police and the smugglers that he returned to Corfu, and in February, 1906, Boles was expelled.

In court he said that he had been ruined the way he was being exploited by the smugglers. The French detectives calculate, however, that these "tips" did not cost more than \$1,500, and believe that he has hidden away the remainder.

COAL UP AT HAMILTON.

Hamilton, Ont., May 1.—The local dealers today boosted the price of coal from \$6.50 to \$7.75 a ton, and they say that it will go still higher before fall.

They say that the reason for the advance is that so much coal is being shipped into the Northwest that they have to pay more than they used to in order to get a supply. They also claim that there is a danger of a coal famine.

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
