

MOTHER SAVES HER CHILD FROM HARM

Man in Case Remanded for Sentence.

The dingy walls of the police court have listened to all kinds of tales from drunks to murderers, but if walls could shudder, they would have shaken this morning when a London woman unfolded a story of an attempt at indecent assault on her pretty little flaxen-haired 3-year-old daughter by Harold Mathews, a man of 30 years of age. Mathews was found guilty and remanded till Saturday for sentence.

The attempt was made before the horrified eyes of the mother, who sat in the window of her house, last Saturday afternoon. When she saw the actions of the man, who had been digging potatoes in the lot next door, she shrieked "If you touch that child I'll kill you," and immediately rushed from the house and grabbed the little girl.

Mathews, who stated he was subject to epileptic fits, told a more or less rambling story that did not quite satisfy the magistrate Graydon, who remanded him for sentence till Saturday.

LOTS OF DISINFECTANT TO PROTECT THE POLICE

Hints For Prevention and Cure of Spanish Influenza

The following directions for use in preventing and treating Spanish influenza have been handed to The Advertiser:

If you notice a heavy, depressed feeling coming on, with headache, weak back, watery eyes, etc., go to bed immediately and call your doctor. If constipated, take a dose of laxative, castor oil, pills or whatever suits you best. Sedilitz powder gives quick results. Keep bowels moved every day.

Influenza in itself is not to be considered serious, but the dangerous feature is that it may develop into pneumonia. The influenza germs enter first into the mouth, throat and nose, and they can be prevented from getting into the air passages and lungs the patient's chances are one thousand times better than otherwise.

To Prevent Pneumonia.

The germs which enter the lungs are the ones which cause pneumonia. With care, in the majority of cases, this can be prevented. The doctor will give you a spray to be used in an atomizer as often as convenient (the oftener, the more germs will be killed). Before using spray, gargle throat thoroughly, wash out mouth and scrub the tongue with the following solution:

Half teaspoonful baking soda, 2 teaspoonfuls of sugar, three-quarters tumbler of water. Stir until dissolved.

This dissolving off mucus, mucous secretions which harbor the germs in the mouth. Then use the atomizer and spray mucus and throat thoroughly to kill any germs that may be left on the surfaces. As it is impossible to destroy all the germs at once, the oftener the spray and gargle are used the more are killed. Never cough, no matter how tickling a sensation you may have.

Coughing scatters the germs, and is one of the great causes of their entering the lungs; besides it rasps raw surfaces in the throat and chest, and makes the germs. A teaspoonful of Russian oil taken occasionally relieves the irritability of the throat.

Medication.

On first going to bed, take one teaspoonful of baking soda and two teaspoonfuls of sugar stirred into a glass of water. Repeat this dose twice a day, at least one hour after eating, while the fever is on.

Food.

Give all the food that can be comfortably taken (no meat). Give broth, with flour stirred in while cooking, cornstarch, jelly, tapioca, gruel with cream, rice, bread and butter. All with as much sugar as possible and drink lots of water. Patient should eat more than during health, and the higher the temperature the more should be eaten to combat it like an automobile, the warmer the engine becomes, the more gasoline it requires to get the same mileage.

Protection of Attendants.

The patient's conversation throws the germs three to four feet into the air, therefore all parties entering the sickroom should wear a mask over the mouth and nose, consisting of four plies of gauze. With this protection, everyone is perfectly safe.

High Temperature.

This does not necessarily indicate a more serious condition. It does tell you that the patient is putting up a determined fight against the germ invasion. If, when the fever is high, the patient becomes very restless, a hot sponge bath every four hours is very beneficial to soothe and rest him.

Between the third and seventh days, when the patient is feeling better, is the time of greatest danger from pneumonia. He should wear a four-ply gauze mask at any time when others are in the room. The attack has left the patient's lungs a very fertile soil for germs that may be coughed or spoken into the lungs by others (many people normally have few pneumonia germs in their mouth, and these keep them from passing into the lungs). During recovery as during the disease, the patient should be fed as much as he can eat, and as much as possible, (See previous list). This will keep the strength up for getting around more quickly and for fighting off the disease. Whatever other medicines the doctor has provided give carefully according to directions.

Red clothing has also been generously supplied by citizens.
