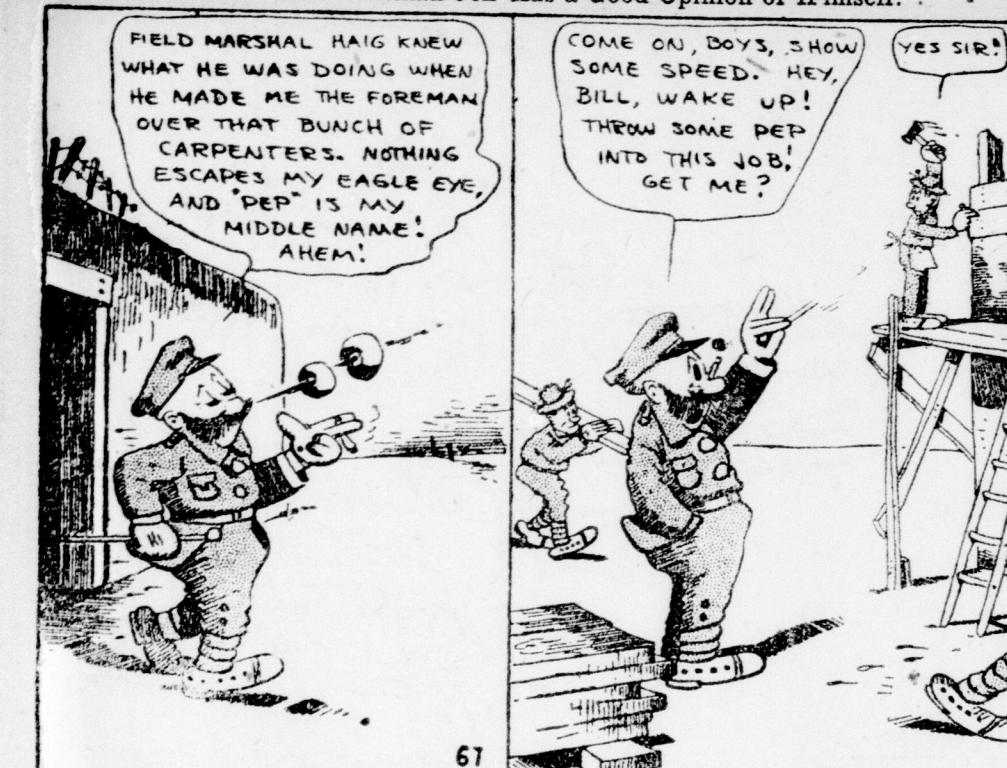

Telegraphic information from Brooklyn, N.Y., states that H. Alex, a flat rider of more or less prominence, died Monday. Alex was ailing last Saturday a week when he piloted A. H. Morris' 2-year-old gelding in a race at Laurel Park. That evening he made an effort to enter a local hospital, but was unable to do so, owing to the crowded condition of the institution in that city because of the prevailing epidemic. U.S. JACKIES TO BOX FOR KING'S TROPHY

Inter-Allied Boxing Tournament in London, England, Dec. 11 and 12.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—Within forty-eight hours the five Great Lakes boxers who have been selected to compete in the Inter-Allied boxing tournament in London on December 11 and 12 will be on their way. Orders received by Commander J. Kaufman from the bureau of navigation contained instructions to send out immediately the teams which will fight for the King's trophy. The men are: Richie Mitchell, lightweight; Cal Delaney, lightweight; Mike Moore, lightweight; Dennis O'Keefe, welterweight; and Jack Heinen, heavyweight.

There's going to be a gladsome get-away, for these scrappers are great favorites at the naval station, but there's going to be added joy for five other Jackies, for the news was released today that each of the boxers who will represent America and the Great Lakes in the big tournament is to be accompanied by a trainer. These trainers were named yesterday. They are: Morrie Bloom, who used to be a pretty shifty person in the welterweight ranks; Abe Kaplan, Teddy Hayes, E. S. Bryant and Jackie Kuvinski.

AMERICAN LEAGUE HAS GREAT RECORD

Fifty-Five Per Cent of 264 Players in Army or Navy.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—Fifty-five per cent of the 264 players under contract or reservation to the eight clubs in the American League are in the army or naval service, according to figures made public here today. The total number is 144, and more than three-fourths of them are in the army.

The Detroit club leads with 25 players, while Boston and Philadelphia are second with 20. Chicago and Cleveland have 19 each, New York and Washington 14 each, and St. Louis 13.

THIRD MAJOR LEAGUE TALK AGAIN REVIVED

National Association Will Be Held Next Week.

The annual meeting of the National Association will be held at Peoria, Ill., on November 12, 13 and 14. Among the many subjects which may be discussed is the advisability of opening the 1919 season if the war has come to a successful conclusion. "Then, too, talk of a third major league may be revived," said President Timmie of the Milwaukee Club. "Last year, when certain magnates of the association were determined to disrupt the A.A., I fought against such proposals. This year, however, at the Peoria gathering I will support such a move. Practically the same questions which will arise at the Peoria meeting will come up for discussion at the annual meeting of the American Association at Chicago early in December, in the opinion of the local club owner."
