D. W. GRIFFITH'S "BROKEN BLOSSOMS" AT GRAND OPERA ALL THIS WEEK

D. W. Griffith's "Broken Blossoms" will begin a week's engagement at the Grand today. The picture has been taken from "The Chink and the Child," the first of the "Limehouse Nights" stories by Thomas Burke, and is set in the dim lit alleys of the London "Chinatown," where the girl, "Lillian," twelve years old, having been beaten almost to death by her father, the prize fighter, Battling Burrows, is taken in and cared for by Cheng Huan, a young Chinaman. Cheng has watched her sufferings silently for a long time, his little room over his shop he fits up with silks and satins in honor of her coming, and for three days he nurses her, then back to health, tendering her his princess. Then the prize fighter hears of where the child has disappeared, and the tragedy follows quickly. Not, however, before some bits of almost lyric loveliness have penetrated through the world atmosphere of the role. Lillian Gish, as the girl-timid, forlorn, a fantastic little creature—contributes much to these, as does Richard Barthelmess, who as the young Chinaman, maintains well the impression of intensity and restraint behind the impassive mask of the Oriental.

The overture and orchestral accompaniment of the picture, including original compositions by Mr. Griffith and Louis F. Gottschalk, heighten the effect of the photoplay.

RICHARD M. TOOTHE, PROMINENT LAWYER, DIED UNEXPECTEDLY

Was Connected With Firm of Meredith & Fisher Ten Years.

Richard M. Toothe, lawyer, a resident of London for the past 10 years, died suddenly at the home of his sister, Mrs. S. K. Davidson, Wellington street, on Saturday evening. Although Mr. Toothe had been in poor health for some weeks, his death was unexpected and came as a shock to his friends and relatives.

For some time Mr. Toothe was attached to the law firm of Becher, Street & Fisher. He later entered into business for himself, and at the time he was taken ill he was connected with the firm of Meredith & Fisher.

Mr. Toothe is survived by three sisters—Mrs. S. K. Davidson and Mrs. A. Falls of Grosvenor street, this city, and another sister living in Hollywood, Cal.

The funeral will be held on Wednesday morning from the residence of Mrs. Davidson Woodland cemetery, at 10 o'clock. Rev. A. A. Trumper of Exeter, a nephew of Mr. Toothe's, will conduct the service.

In speaking of the sudden death of Mr. Toothe, R. G. Fisher of the firm of Meredith & Fisher said "Mr. Toothe was a brilliant lawyer, showing indomitable energy, and he was a man of fine character. Owing to his deafness he never took a prominent part in court cases."

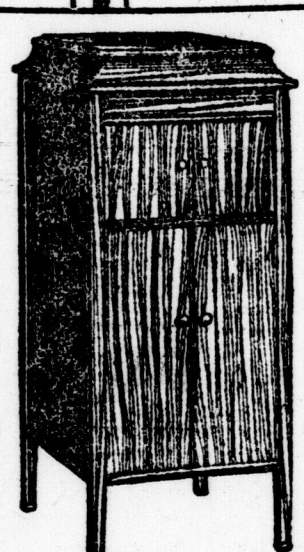

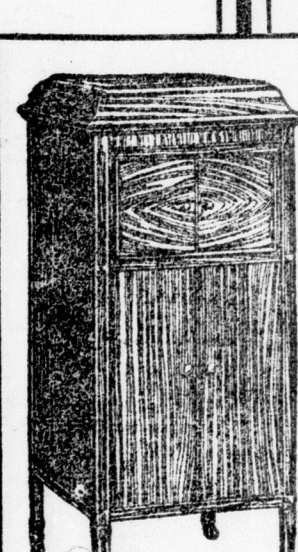
