 HAMILTON, May 17.—(Special.)—Mrs. Neville was arrested this evening on the charge of stealing an overcoat. About 5 o'clock she ran off with a shoe from the front of Patrick Arnold's store, but Arnold ran after her and secured his property.
 Arrangements have been made by which Sol Matwick will act as the representative of Pat Powers and handle Tom Longboat. St. Yves will meet Sellen and Tom Coley on the evening of May 24, at Britannia Park, in a 12-mile race.

 The Ontario Government's free tuberculosis exhibit, which is being shown in connection with the convention of the Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, was opened this afternoon in the Knox Morgan Building, East King-street. This evening Dr. Davy delivered an address on "The Prevention of Consumption," and Dr. Hollabrook spoke on "Tuberculosis in Childhood."

Elevator in Church.
 The newly installed elevator at the Centenary Church was used for the first time yesterday. It is the gift of Mrs. W. E. Sanford.

The residents of Euclid-avenue have notified the board that if it attempts to use the consumptive hospital building at the end of the city hospital grounds for the care of advanced case of consumption they will apply for an injunction to be a "Yellow Kid" who used to be a celebrity on the streets of the city, has been claimed by his father, David Kidd, Toronto, the man who was left a fortune by an Australian, whose daughter he saved.

Removing the Remains.

The plot was allowed to get into a dilapidated condition, and the family entered into negotiations with the parks board by which the board was to undertake to erect an \$800 stone and keep the plot in good condition, and the family to erect a plot over to the city. MISSION TO THE JEWS
 First Annual Meeting Held in Old St. Andrew's Church.

The first annual meeting of the Presbyterian Mission to the Jews was held in Old St. Andrew's Church last night. The Rev. J. McP. Scott was in the chair.
 The Rev. S. B. Rohold, who is in charge of the mission, and is himself a converted Jew, read the report for the past year, giving an account of the different activities in connection with the mission. The report showed the past year to have been one of progress.

The Hon. W. A. Charlton, Principal Gandler of Knox College, Dr. R. E. MacKay, foreign mission secretary, Rev. Mr. Scott, Dr. J. Neil, Rev. Alex. Gilray delivered short addresses. One of the Jewish converts sang a solo in Yiddish.
 The report of the night school showed an aggregate attendance of 955, with an average of 420. During the year 2316 cases were treated at the dispensary, while 225 visits were made to the sick.

ANTIPODEANS SEE CITY GUIDED BY EX. DIRECTORS

Wonders of Toronto Spread Before Australian Guests—Ladies Entertained at Luncheon

The Australian and New Zealand journalists, including the ladies of the party, enjoyed the hospitality of the Exhibition Association in the form of an automobile trip to the exhibition grounds yesterday.
 Before starting out they visited the city hall, about 25 in number, and called informally upon President Ward. The visitors showed themselves much impressed with the appearance of Toronto, as seen from the city hall tower, and the stately grandeur of the civic exhibition buildings.
 The exhibition officers who played the part of hosts were: Ex-President W. K. George, Manager Orr, Architect George Gounlock, and J. K. Munro. The antipodeans were taken by surprise at the number and size of the exhibition buildings.
 The remainder of the day was spent quietly in seeing the city.
 The ladies were entertained to a luncheon by Mrs. W. K. George. They go to Niagara Falls to-day, returning in time to take the train for Ottawa to-night.

MAY HAVE BEEN IN ROCKIES

Minnesota Expert's Views on Western Quake.
 MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., May 17.—(Special.)—That the people of the Canadian prairies west of Winnipeg who were shaken out of beds by a general "triffle" from the Rockies to-night, were disturbed by quake resulting from an upheaval in the Rocky Mountains, is the opinion of Frederick W. Sardson, Ph.D., of the University of Minnesota. Said Prof. Sardson:
 "The district affected is within the Rocky Mountain region. The shaking of the earth was undoubtedly caused by an upheaval in these mountains, which it has been discovered are constantly rising. An upheaval of some sort probably started that long shake across the prairie. A range of mountains in Montana is, I believe, not far from the scene of the disturbance. The Black Hills are also a detached section of the Rockies, and any change in them might cause a shake in the country around there. Any part of the country west of the Missouri River is subject to earthquake disturbance."

"I do not agree with Prof. Allen of Manitoba University, that the earthquake is one in South America. The interior of the earth is plastic—solid, and the earthquake waves could not travel thru it any more than they could thru dough. If the wave came from South America it would have traveled along the crusts and in that case we would have felt it, too."

ANOTHER QUAKE

An earthquake quaking at 3:12 a.m. yesterday and continuing one hour and 32 minutes, was recorded on the local seismograph yesterday, the violent period occurring from 3:21 to 3:31.
 It was estimated the quake was 480 miles distant. Saturday night's shock in the west was barely noted here.
