

YORK CO. FARMERS WELL ADVANCED WITH WORK

Looks Like Big Field For Warden-ship—East Toronto News—County Happenings.

The farmers out thru York County, from one end to the other, are making good progress in the gathering of their field crops of mangolds, turnips, potatoes and the dozen and one other odd jobs which fall to the lot of the average farmer at this time of the year.

The work of picking apples, too, is well completed, but in some parts the winter fruit has not been yet gathered. A gratifying feature is the comparatively larger yield than was anticipated earlier in the season. In quantity and quality it is a long time since the farmers of York County had a better yield of fruit.

A feature which has this fall been more than ever extensively introduced out in the county is the use of the disk harrow, the benefits of which are becoming every year more apparent. The rapid growth of food seeds has rendered some extra precaution absolutely necessary, and the active use of the disk harrow immediately after the crop has been taken off, stirring up the soil and germinating the weeds will, it is hoped, do much toward clearing the land. Scores of farmers are this season using the disk harrow who never did so before. The soil, thus, is, unfortunately, immune from this kind of treatment.

Fall wheat generally all over York County is looking remarkably well and in some places notably up in King Township and around Schomberg, the growth is very luxuriant.

In spite of the unfavorable outlook earlier in the season and the comparative scarcity of grass, cattle are going into winter quarters in as good condition as in former years. Economical feeding, such as is now practised by the farmers of the county, the presence of silos, coupled with the cutting of feed and the pulling of roots, will go far toward warding off any serious results from a shortage either in the grain or straw supply.

With well filled barns and wallets and record prices for all kinds of farm products, the lot of the average York Co. farmer is to-day an enviable one.
